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A Matter of Appearance by Emily Wells

A dazzling memoir of chronic illness that explores the fraught intersection between pain, language, and gender, by a debut author.

Emily Wells spent her childhood dancing through intense pain she assumed was normal for a ballerina pushing her body to its limits. For years, no doctor could tell Wells what was wrong with her, or they told her it was all in her head.

In *A Matter of Appearance*, Wells traces her journey as she tries to understand and define the chronic pain she has lived with all her life. She draws on the critical works of Freud, Sontag, and others to explore the intersection between gender, pain, and language, and she traces a direct line from the “hysteria patients” at the Salpêtrière Hospital in nineteenth-century Paris to the contemporary New Age healers in Los Angeles, her stomping ground. At the crux of Wells’ literary project is the dilemma of how to diagnose an experience that is both private and public, subjective and quantifiable, and how to express all this in words.

EMILY WELLS is a writer based in Los Angeles. She holds an MFA in creative writing from UC Riverside, and now teaches writing at UC Irvine. She writes for publications including *Bookforum*, *Vogue*, *Interview Magazine*, *The Lost Angeles Review of Books*, *The White Review*, *Flash Art*, *Purple Fashion Magazine*, and many others. Previously, she has been a magazine editor, fashion model, crime reporter, and classically trained ballet dancer.







The Girl Prince: Virginia Woolf, Race, and the Dreadnought Hoax by Danell Jones

THE GIRL PRINCE is a revelatory new biography of Virginia Woolf. Danell Jones uses the *Dreadnought Hoax* as an entry point to the writer's life, and presents an illuminating picture of race, gender and identity in the first half of the twentieth century.

In 1910, Virginia Woolf dressed in black-face and men's clothes and made headlines for ridiculing the pride of the British Navy, the HMS *Dreadnought*.


The *Dreadnought Hoax* is infamous - the group's photograph was acquired by the National Portrait Gallery - but the events themselves are wholly misreported and misunderstood; their implication on race, gender and class tell a compelling story about Woolf's time, and the stories we tell for and about ourselves.

In *The Girl Prince*, Danell Jones gives a new narrative of Virginia Woolf through the Hoax – a complex young girl eager to be included with her brother's hi-jinks, a family in turmoil, and latterly a distinguished writer loose with facts – that paints a captivating picture of the first half of the twentieth century.

DANELL JONES is a Woolf scholar, whose work has earned a Bennett Cerf Writing Award and a Whiting Fellowship. She is the author of *The Virginia Woolf Writers' Workshop* (Bantam) and, most recently, *An African in Imperial London* (Hurst/OUP).

The Crocodile Bride by Ashleigh Bell Pedersen

Set during the swampy summer in 1982, this stunning debut novel follows eleven-year-old Sunshine Turner and her troubled father Billy as the secrets of their family's past swirl around them in the one-road town of Fingertip, Louisiana.

During a hot summer of June moods, grubworms, and dark storms, Sunshine discovers stones in her chest – and learns the dangers her coming-of-age will bring about in the yellow house she shares with her father. Without the vocabulary to comprehend Billy's actions or her own changing body,

Sunshine turns to an apocryphal story passed down from her grandmother: in the dark waters of the Black Bayou lives a crocodile with an insatiable appetite and a woman with a mysterious healing gift. As Sunshine's summer unspools, she turns to the one person who will need no explanation of the family secrets she carries—the crocodile bride.

The Crocodile Bride is at once a heartbreakingly tender coming-of-age tale and a lyrical, haunting reflection on generational trauma. Reminiscent of Jesmyn Ward and Helen Oyeyemi, Ashleigh Bell Pedersen is a promising new voice in American fiction



Tender Maps: Travels in Search of the Emotion of Place by Alice Maddicott

Alice Maddicott wants to know what we mean when we talk about the ‘atmosphere’ of a place. In this personal account of travelling, reading, walking and absorbing the feeling of place she takes us from Tbilisi to Nashville, Istanbul to Japan, Prince Edward Island to the Wiltshire Downs.

Alice Maddicott has journeyed relentlessly and widely throughout her life. But this is more than a travelogue – it’s also a journey of ideas about how we experience place. Whether she is in search of Pamuk’s Istanbul or exploring the West Country Gothic strand that runs from Elizabeth Goudge to PJ Harvey Maddicott is rich, erudite company.

The book culminates in a manifesto on the power of being in place; of recognising the sentience of places, and entering into a dialogue with our cities. A collaboration with the land. Of seeing atmosphere – the emotion of place – as something political and vital, not a passive, negligible background to our activities.

ALICE MADDICOTT is a writer and artist from Somerset, England. For nearly two decades she has worked on creative education projects and run writing workshops with young people. She lives with two rescue cats, Tariel and Sindri, and Ptolemy the tortoise who she’s had for 35 years.



My Hummingbird Father by Pascale Petit

When artist Dominique receives a letter from her dying father, a reckoning with repressed memories and a pull for romantic and familial love sends shockwaves through her life, as she journeys to Paris to face the places and events of her early years.

Balanced with visits to the Venezuelan Amazon, where Dominique explores a spiritual and loving longing (meeting a young guide, Juan), a raw and tender unfolding of this love story is a parallel to the uncovering of the shocking truth of Dominique's birth, and her parents' relationship.

Pascale Petit's *My Hummingbird Father* is a beautifully lyrical debut novel in dialogue with Pascale's Ondaatje and Laurel Prize-winning poetry collection, *Mama Amazonica*.

PASCALE PETIT was born in Paris, grew up in France and Wales and lives in Cornwall. She is of French, Welsh and Indian heritage. 

Gloss by Kyra Wilder

In this semi-experimental second novel, Kyra Wilder transposes the Greek myth of the Hesperides to Marin County in California at the turn of the Millennium.

Ari, Eleni and Hesper, three young adults struggling with an eating disorder, are reunited after they met one summer at the unconventional, rural treatment facility Golden Apples Farm. A trial is underway, and the girls attempt to elucidate what it is exactly that happened with Lee, the charismatic man and passionate cook who runs Golden Apples.

With childlike candour and a lightness of tone that belies the seriousness of her subject Wilder elaborates a kaleidoscopic picture of trauma, in the protagonists' own words. Through a succession of short chapters, evocative of a study in music, *Gloss* makes for a new psychological thriller with surreal hijinks, bringing together the symbolic and the hyperreal, and opposites that are somehow never so far apart: succulence and abjection, human and animal stories, traditional cuisine and synthetic foods, speleology, deep sea diving, remembering and forgetting, healing and hurting, or tending unpicked apples — to perhaps discover all that a girl may and can be.

KYRA WILDER is an author and poet who grew up in the United States and received her BA and MA in English Literature from San Francisco State University. She worked as a pasta chef at the Michelin-starred Quince under Michael Tusk, continuing her culinary career in restaurants in New York before moving with her family to Switzerland where she now lives. Her first novel, *Little Bandaged Days*, was published by Pan Macmillan in 2021. *Gloss* is her second novel, and her first to be published by Les Fugitives.

***The Polish Mafia* by Christopher Othen (The History Press, WORLD)**

Christopher Othen's THE POLISH MAFIA: GUNS, DRUGS, AND MURDER IN THE WILD, WILD EAST is a story about a ground-breaking betrayal in the Polish Mafia; more than this, though, it's a universal story of poverty and greed, and what happens in a power vacuum at nation-state scale.

Most Europeans think of Poland and associate it with pierogi, migrant workers, and questionable LGBTQ+ policies. But after the fall of communism, Poland was a gangster state where criminals bled the country dry while police and politicians looked the other way.

When the Cold War ended and the country was left in limbo, a story played out in this poor, icy corner of Eastern Europe as thuggish gangsters meted it out for dominance - and its Mafia would spread its tentacles across Poland, Europe, and all the way to South America.

Christopher Othen is a popular history writer, whose many books, from *The Men from Miami* to *The King of Nazi Paris*, have been reviewed in *The Times*, *The Telegraph*, *The TLS* – serialised in the *Daily Express* and featured in *The Big Issue*.

***Invisible Infrastructure* by Lukasz Bednarski (Columbia University Press, WORLD)**

INVISIBLE INFRASTRUCTURE: THE HIDDEN BUILDING BLOCKS THAT RUN THE MODERN WORLD tells the revelatory story of the networks that shape countries' power, welfare and politics through the technology supply chain – with a specific focus on the US-Asia dynamic.

From iPhones to fighter jets, individual to state, our lives are dependent on technology – and technology is dependent on its invisible building blocks – chips, batteries, advanced materials, and satellites.

These key materials represent an unprecedented blurring of geopolitics: key components historically outsourced by the West become bedrocks of developing economies; Apple chips made in Taiwan influence US attitudes and international policy – and Taiwan's standing on the world stage. INVISIBLE INFRASTRUCTURE explores the way in which this global network of interdependence shapes world powers, and points towards an upsetting of the global power balance.

Lukasz Bednarski is the author of *Lithium: The Global Race for Battery Dominance and the New Energy Revolution* (Hurst, 2021). He began his career supplying critical materials for high-tech companies, before moving to analyse supply chains for top market research firms. He is a Senior Lithium and Battery Metals Analyst at IHS Markit.

***Ravshan's Real Stories* by Ilya Leutin, translated by Anna Aslanyan (Paper + Ink, WORLD ENGLISH)**

The PEN translates-winning *Ravshan's Real Stories* collects the work of Russian writer Ilya Leutin for the first time in the English language; two of these stories featured in *The White Review*, and Vadim Levental said simply 'Everything is beautiful in this book'.

Uncanny and boundary-pushing, Leutin's stories are incisive on love, loss, sex, death, art, politics, and myth; from 'Dictators' Hands' ('There are different versions as to what happened to the hands of the Argentine dictator Juan Perón, allegedly stolen after his death') to 'The State of Things', in which a young man struggling between his sexuality and his love of music befriends an old woman, a Parisienne washed up in Moscow, the only surviving witness to the events of a bygone era.

Ilya Leutin was born in Siberia in 1986. A video artist with a background in film, he has worked as a screenwriter and contributed to a number of Russian publications. *Ravshan's Real Stories* was published in 2012, and longlisted for the National Bestseller award and shortlisted for the Debut prize.
