


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Alessandro Piperno Dove la storia finisce Where the Story Ends

The return of Alessandro Piperno: a real blast!



When Matteo Zevi abruptly left for California to get away from a loan shark, his family's life was turned upside-down. Twenty years later he returns to Rome just as unexpectedly, but his reappearance could turn into an even greater turmoil for his loved ones. During his unintentional exile in Los Angeles, Matteo worked some dubious jobs, like catering for a porn production company or marrying and leaving women for Green Card purposes. Meanwhile, his wife and his children tried to move on. His eldest son Giorgio opened the Orient Express, the most popular club in Rome, and is now expecting his first child.

His daughter Martina married an easy going fellow, but she has been having a hard time ever since she kissed Benedetta, her husband's sister. Matteo's second wife Federica is the only one who never forgot him, anxiously waiting for his return.

And while everyone is busy, painstakingly disentangling the threads of their own existences, History abruptly interrupts their daily routines in an unexpected and terrible way.

ALESSANDRO PIPERNO (Rome, 1972) teaches French Literature at the University of Rome and is a regular contributor to the paper "Corriere della Sera." He made his sensational debut in 2005 with Con le peggiori intenzioni, which was translated in twenty languages. It was followed by Persecuzione (shortlisted for the prizes Médicis et Femina, winner of Prix du Meilleur Livre Étranger 2011) and by Inseparabili (Premio Strega 2012), which together compose the diptych entitled Il fuoco amico dei ricordi.

Gianni Amelio Politeama Politeama

A moving and deeply unsettling coming of age novel

Southern Italy, 1950s. Little Luigino's childhood is filled with hardship and anger, which make him grow up quickly, far from any family bond: his mother was locked up in an insane asylum at an early age, and he never met his father.

But Luigino has a dream: he wants to sing on the radio, or maybe on that new device called television. He grows up fearlessly confronting every misfortune and candidly accepting the ambiguities of his passion, while his singing becomes as soft and sinuous as the voice of famous showgirls. He is offered a few gigs imitating them on stage for circus shows and curtain raisers. The audience

applauds him and mocks him, but doesn't manage to undermine his natural innocence.

When his show business path is blocked, Luigino sets off searching for his place in the world. He ends up in Rome, where he meets a fifteen-year-old waitress, as alone as he is. For an instant he tastes the sweetness of someone's affection followed by the heartbreak of being abandoned, dragging his life in what seems like a descent into the underworld.


Gianni Amelio is one of the most highly regarded Italian filmmakers. Stefano Massini Qualcosa sui Lehman Something about the Lehmans

An astounding journey not unlike the ballad of a storyteller: a powerful narrator who will draw you in and never let you go.

Stefano Massini's work was already an international cult phenomenon when the Italian legendary theatre director Luca Ronconi brought it on stage by with an all-star cast in January 2015. It has since been produced widely in Europe. Oscar Awardwinning director Sam Mendes will be staging The Lehman Trilogy in October 2017 for the National Theatre in London. For the first time, the unabridged version is published in a new edition that also includes the cuts made by Luca Ronconi.

Stefano Massini's text has the style and the rhythm of an epic poem, which portrays 150 years of the history of capitalism, spanning from 1844 (when the first of the Lehman brothers, Henry, arrived in the United States) to 2008, when the bank that the family founded in New York declared bankruptcy. As Massini himself explains, "it shouldn't be seen as the story of a bank, it is neither a celebration nor a critique. One finds it, rather, a story of the successes and failures of three generations struggling with the traditions of a rapidly changing society."

Stefano Massini (Florence, 1975) is the most talented Italian playwright, as well as the third artistic director of the Piccolo Teatro in Milan (following in the footsteps of Giorgio Strehler and Luca Ronconi) and its leading dramatist. He has written several plays, including Donna non rieducabile: a piece about Anna Politkovskaja, which has been portrayed in theaters worldwide.

Paolo Sorrentino with photos by Jacopo Benassi Gli aspetti irrilevanti Irrelevant Traits

An imaginary journey through ordinary lives masterfully arranged by two iconic artists

When Paolo Sorrentino first saw the portraits made by the photographer Jacopo Benassi, he immediately fell in love with them and had an idea: he wanted to tell the stories of the people captured by Benassi's camera. Not their real lives, but imaginary tales evoked by their faces.

The result is an original and wonderful book made of images and words, sometimes touching, sometimes ironic, just like the entirety of Sorrentino's artistic production.

He is capable of capturing human life in its extraordinary complexity, showing us how the essential elements are hidden in seemingly irrelevant instances, and that life is a series of apparently trivial moments and rare revelations: a strikingly auteured vision that could have only been created by Sorrentino's visionary talent.

PAOLO SORRENTINO (Naples, 1970) is one of the most famous Italian filmmakers. He won an Academy Award and a Golden Globe for Best Foreign Film with the movie La grande bellezza (The Great Beauty, 2013). His mini-series The Young Pope is about to be released by HBO.

JACOPO BENASSI is a photographer who works with some of the major newspapers. In 2011, he launched "talkinass paper and records," producing a magazine and CDs of live recordings of international artists in the underground scene.

A hymn to female sensuality in a dark novel of passion and death



A beutiful and young woman, art critic, married to a noted and older journalist, who respects her desire for freedom.

When she suddenly disappears, it will be up to commissario Maurizi to disclose her multifaceted personality and the mysterious sides of her mind, starting from the fresco by Beato Angelico she was studyng and interpreting, the one dedicated to the words pronounced by Jesus Christ to Mary Magdalena in the moment of his resurrection: "Noli me tangere".

Marcello Introna Percoco Percoco

"My name will enter everyday language like 'paper', 'bread', and 'water'..."

This novel is based on a true story. Set in the southern city of Bari in the 1950s, it is the story of Franco, a college student, the only apparently functional member of his family. Vittorio, his older brother is in jail for kleptomania; Giulio, the youngest, suffers from Down syndrome. His father Vincenzo, a railway inspector, is a weak and resigned man; his mother, Eresvida, is a housewife obsessed with social standing, and wants her son to earn a college degree at any cost. Too mortified to admit that he has failed several important classes in college, Franco decides to lie and manage to convince everyone he is a brilliant student. The

novel follows the main character and his web of deception up to the dramatic ending.

A powerful, urgent and absorbing account of an individual and a compelling journey into his human vulnerability. Not to forget Introna's new and unique writing talent.

Marcello Introna (born in Bari in 1977) is primarily a veterinarian. He is also a TV and film screenwriter. First published in an early version in 2012, *Percoco* is now being released in a new and completely revised edition.



Emanuele Tonon Fervore Fervor

An intensely poetical, literary gem



"We were given song to uplift us, together, huddled in prayer and ritual. And we were singing so enraptured, we could have been flung about and we would not have felt the weight of our own flesh. We would follow each other's voices through the air, so oblivious of our flesh we would dream and become birds flying through the trees, deer running across the earth's crust, dolphins darting through water." The unnamed narrator is a former monk who calls together, in memory, the confrères with whom he lived a year of strict enclosure in a Franciscan monastery during his novitiate year, when he was preparing to take his vows. He ran away from home at eighteen, inflamed by a need to find a superior sense to his life, found refuge in a monastery and a faith, both tender and shocking.

A haunting novel that captures aspiration and loss and ultimately the fervor that drove him to dress in sackcloth.

EMANUELE TONON (Naples, 1970) at nineteen entered the Franciscan convent of Spello, left in 1996. He is the author of the novel *Il nemico* (2009) and *La luce prima* (2011), soon to be translated in France by Verdier.

Widad Tamimi Le rose del vento The Roses of the Wind

A sumptuously imagined story of crossed destinies

A son of Jewish traders and bankers, Charles Weiss was born in 1924 in Trieste, then a lively cultural and economic center. The family villa was the meeting point for artists. In 1938, the political situation escalated and Charles and his family were forced to escape for the United States.

Khader was born in Hebron, Palestine in 1948, the very year the State of Israel was founded. His family was poor and lived together in one room home made of bricks and sheet metal. His dream: to become a paediatrician and help the children in his country. He studied, joined his father in Egypt, but they returned to Hebron, and with a new war in 1967, they became refugees once again and fled to Amman, Jordan. Charles returns to Italy in 1947 and Khader follows his lifelong dream to Italy where he finally becomes a doctor. Here he meets and marries beautiful and rebellious Claudia, Charles' eldest daughter.


Their little girl, the daughter of a Jew and a Palestinian, tells their story.

Francesco Vidotto Fabro Fabro

The epic tale of the most famous organ player of the Dolomites



"My name is Fabro, and the only thing I know about my father is that he was a blacksmith without a shred of imagination."

This is how the epic tale of Fabro begins. A simple man, but also a strong person capable of getting back on his feet after the blows that life deals him. He spent his childhood in poverty in the woods of the Dolomites. After witnessing his father's suicide, he has to step up as head of the household and becomes an expert in making miniscule keys. Until the day he discovers music in an ancient harmonium stowed away in an old church. Even though he never touched a musical instrument before, he

sits on the bench, looks out the window, and starts playing: all he has to do is listen to the melody of the mountains. Music helps him discover love, true love: her name is Rina and she will save him in every possible way.

Francesco Vidotto was born in 1976. After working as business manager for several years, he decided to go back to writing and moved to the Dolomites. His work has been published by several local publishers and has won some prestigious awards dedicated to mountain-themed literature.

Gian Mario Villalta Scuola di felicità School of Happiness

A passionate novel about the complexity of the relationships in the school

The life of a teacher is never easy: the bored expressions on the students' faces, their constant fidgeting on their phones during class, the stifling air caused by their wafting hormones and closed windows. The awareness that "good students would succeed no matter who's teaching them, but bad students will fail because of you."

The already complicated day-today classroom administration is made even more difficult by the arrival of a new headmaster, Lisa Bardella, who is determined to rationalize everything. Will the story's narrator, a teacher in his fifties, manage to resist under the new headmaster's crazy administration? Will he rediscover his passion for teaching? And why does a group of students call him in the middle of the night to be picked up after a mysterious excursion under the stars? And what's the deal with students splitting up in two opposing factions, the "rotten" and the "posh"?

GIAN MARIO VILLALTA (Pordenone, 1959) is a highly acclaimed Italian poet, winner with Vanità della mente of the 2011 Premio Viareggio. He is also the author of the novels Tuo figlio (2004) and Alla fine di una infanzia felice (2013).

A mother knows how to get behind the right saint



Finding a job in Italy during the current economic crisis is not that difficult, you just have to know how the game is played. And the ambitious and manipulating Maristella, mother of an only child, Ernesto, knows exactly how. The first move? Get behind the right saint. Raised in adversity and widowed after only three years of marriage, for years she dreamed of radical and social redemption. Her early involvement with Alfonso Malatesta, a mob boss, has left her with few scruples and a cunning knowledge of how to work the system. Ernesto has recently managed to receive his degree in economics and Malatesta proves

to be the right saint. That's why he gets his job. But where will his ambition lead to?

The rise and fall of a young man who thought he could escape the misery of the Quartieri Spagnoli in Naples.

Palo Santo is a remote village in the Argentine pampas with a population of 200, where all the inhabitants know each other. Rumors here run faster than the winds that foretell a coming storm. While the seamstress is sewing a coat for the butcher's daughter, who stuffs herself with pastries and never ceases to gain weight, a strange and disturbing murder takes place and a series of unusual events begin to unfold. And what unspeakable secret does

An emotionally-engaging story of love, infidelity and loss

Vera was five years old the summer her father died: she was a very creative young girl and her imaginary friend was Ringo Starr. Now she is a thirty-yearold woman with a bright career presenting sassy horoscopes on television. But things change after her partner dumps her, filling the void he left with sarcasm and feigned aplomb. One day, her mother hands her a manuscript that her father wrote in his last few months. The book is about her. Vera, about her mother Lia, a nonconformist costume designer from the provincial town of Campobasso, and about her grandmother, Santa, who consecrated her entire life to her

children. Vera and her mother never spoke about Giordano, Vera's father and Lia's husband, to spare each other's feelings. Is Lia hiding something? Not only does Vera have to confront the friendly fire of memories, but she is also faced with a challenge: the book does not have an ending. She might be the one who has to finish writing it and finally figure out what happened that summer when everything changed.

Carmelo Sardo Per una madre To a Mother


Can we escape our family's fate?



A mysterious child marked by a gift and a curse, a corrupt court, and a cruel duke



November 1510. It has been raining for days and the Po River is about to flood the fields around Friar Bernardo's hut. when a wearied horse carrying a baby stops at his door. Bernardo knows all about the medicinal properties of plants and he lives alone, so he takes the child in and helps him grow up as best as he can. He discovers that little Ruggero actually comes from the palace of Cittastella, which belongs to Duke Filippo, a man renowned for his cruelty. Filippo spends his days barricaded in his castle, surrounded by the flattery of hypocritical subjects, astrologists, dwarfs, and jesters. Ruggero is marked by a curse

and a gift: he is the only one who will be able to save Cittastella from the duke's brutality and his court's depravity. The story unfolds before a backdrop of bloody clashes between local lords, mercenaries fighting for Emperor Charles V and the Warrior Pope Julius II, while the plague extends its dark shadow.

GUIDO CONTI (Parma, 1965) is the author of Le mille bocche della nostra sete, which was translated in Spanish and Dutch. He also edited a collection of short stories written by Cesare Zavattini in his early years, and wrote Giovannino Guareschi. Biografia di uno scrittore.

Pietro Valsecchi La Vendetta The Revenge

The return of the Palermo brothers, who take on New York from two opposite sides of the law

New York, 1920s. Sal Palermo is rising in the ranks of organized crime, believing it is the only way he can avenge himself for being wronged because of his humble origins. He has many enemies to face, starting from Di Bella, the local godfather who was once his boss.


His brother Frank stands on the other side of the barricade. He is a cop, straight as an arrow, who believes with every fiber of his body that being an officer of the law is the only way to keep corruption in check and bring justice. Despite caring deeply for his brother, he will have to take him down. But Frank's problems start from his very own precinct.

His colleagues distrust him for his family ties to Sal. But it is mostly because of the allegations of mob collusion he made, which casted a shadow of suspicions over much of the police force.

Their other Palermo siblings also come into play. Nina, a fragile creature married to Angelo (a singer in love with another woman), and Tony, naïve, romantic, and destined to become a filmmaker in Hollywood.

PIETRO VALSECCHI (Crema, 1953) an expert in film and theater, partnered with Camilla Nesbit in 1992 to found the leading film production company TaoDue Film, that has created some of the most important film and TV series in Italy.

The first part of *Prima famiglia*'s trilogy was released in 2015.



Katia Bernardi Funne Girls

A real-life fairy tale with a genuinely happy ending



Twelve "girls" who have long dreamed of seeing the sea. What makes them girls isn't their biological age: it is their ability to dream. These women are eighty to ninety years old and they live in the tiny Alpine village of Daone in the Trentino region of Northern Italy. They have always lived between their homes and the fields; for many of them the only diversion was going to mass on Sunday or meeting up at the local club. That is where they realized they all shared a common passion: seeing the sea. They are known as the "Funne" (which means "women" in their local dialect) and they would make their seaside dream come true:

they would travel to the island of Ugljan, Croatia (chosen because it has the same patron saint as Daone: the Madonna of the Snow), by raising money through a crowdfunding campaign.

Katia Bernardi narrates their adventure in this book and in a documentary film, that will soon be distributed.

KATIA BERNARDI is a writer and documentary filmmaker from Trentino. She was been following the "funne" and their fundraising endeavours with the camera ever since. The film is to be released soon.

Virginia de Winter La spia del mare The Spy from the Sea

From the best Italian fan fiction writer an historical novel set in Venice

Venice, 1741. Cordelia Sheffield is a British spy, beautiful, smart, and lethal. Cassandra Giustinian, instead, is a charmingly graceful Venetian noblewoman suffering from a mysterious illness. Nobody knows they are twins, that they share one life and love the same man: Cassian d'Armer, a handsome spy who works for the Doge and is tormented by his past marked by war and violence. When the Inquisitors of the Republic of Venice extend their shadow over the secrets of the Giustinian family, Cassian will put everything at stake to save the woman he loves from death. The fight will bind him fatally to three men: a French nobleman escaped

from the Court of Versailles, a peer from Spain in voluntary exile, and a young abbot by the name Giacomo Casanova. The skilled swordsman and brazen womanizer will lead them through the narrow streets of Venice, lavish balls, and the glorious frenzy of the Carnival. The comeback of one of Italy's most famous fan fiction writers.

The fictional epistolary novel between Anna Karenina and Emma Bovary



Anna Karenina was traveling through Italy with her lover Vronskij when she struck up a correspondence almost by chance. She started exchanging letters with a lady from Yonville called Emma Bovary who sought refuge in books to escape the monotony of her country life. They write each other about their respective lives, partly based on their namesake novels and partly fictional. But Anna and Emma are not the only stars that shine in this sky. While visiting the Guermantes family, Anna meets Charles Swann. He shows her an unconventional side of Paris and introduces her to his mistress, the courtesan Odette de Crécy.

Meanwhile, in a theatre in Rouen, Emma meets Rhett Butler and Rossella O'Hara.

One letter after the other, Anna and Emma share their most intimate thoughts, chasing one another but never quite crossing paths, until they lose each other forever because of a letter delivered too late...

MAROSELLA DI FRANCIA and DANIELA MASTROCINQUE (both from Naples) were high-school teachers. This is their first novel.

Carmine Abate Il banchetto di nozze e altri sapori The Wedding Banquets and Other Flavors

An emotional and geographic journey through Italian food

A collection of short stories depicting an autobiographic journey along the leitmotif of food. The flavors that remind us of belonging somewhere, like the story about the author as a young boy, waiting for his father to come back for Christmas while the scent of pastries baking in the oven filled the air.

Food creates a sense of identity and becomes the leading thread in these pages. The beach of Cirò Marina has the sweet taste of bread and soft frittata (omelette) that one of the character eats while walking down the beach. Rain evokes the salty flavor of sardines, because in times of drought it was customary to carry

in a procession a statue of Saint Anthony with a sardine over his lips, so the saint would feel thirsty and make it rain. CARMINE ABATE was born in 1954 in Carfizzi, an Italian-Albanian community in Calabria, southern Italy. He is the author of a glorious series of prize-winning novels, among which *La collina del vento* (Premio Campiello 2012).



Flavio Santi La primavera tarda ad arrivare The Late Spring

The first case in the Drago Furlan's series



Drago Furlan is an inspector living in the coutryside. He looks a lot like Ernest Hemingway and lives a charmed life in his small provincial world of local sports, scuttlebutt at the tavern, and day trips with his girlfriend, Perla. He hasn't dealt with murders for ten years, but rather with the odd theft or fender bender.

It's nearly spring when the mysterious murder of an elderly John Doe finally forces him to wear his detective's cap. His investigation will take him across the beautiful Friulian countryside with stops at country inns for classic fare. Secrets and inconvenient truths linking back to the darkest days of the Second

World War will slowly emerge; the whole story told with an ironic style and charm.

The rest is history, one made of triumphs, magnificent cars, and great pilots. ENZO FERRARI was born just outside Modena in 1899, and died in Bologna in 1988. Ferrari is the first Italian brand in the world.





Joseph Ratzinger is widely recognized as one of the most brilliant theologians and spiritual leaders of our age. He was born in Germany in 1929 and the rise of Nazism and the war deeply affected his life. Ratzinger was elected pope in 2005, taking the name Benedict XVI. He promoted a path of purification for the Roman Catholic Church at a time when it was rattled by sexual abuse scandals and

financial controversies. He repeatedly suggested Europe should embrace its Christian roots and build a new humanism for the twenty-first century.

Benedict XVI was misunderstood by many and, in 2013, he stunned the world by resigning from the papacy. It was a clamorous move that many saw as a sign of the decline of Catholicism, but it was the opposite: it was a seed under the snow, necessary to open the Church to a more universal dimension and to the renewal undertaken by his successor. ELIO GUERRIERO is a theologian, a historian, and the author of Hans Urs von Balthasar (1991), Il sigillo di Pietro (1996), Il dramma di Dio (1999) and Il libro dei santi (2012). He has been the chief editor of the Italian version of the journal "Communio" for over twenty years. He has known Benedict XVI closely since the Eighties, handling the Italian translations of many of his works, and editing several anthologies collecting his writings and speeches.



In 1869, a royal decree dissolved the city council of Reggio Calabria because of the 'ndrangheta. The same thing happened in Bardonecchia in 1995. It was the first case discovered in northern Italy, that is until the city council of Bordighera was also dissolved for mafia infiltration in 2011. This book illustrates how organized crime bosses have never openly challenged the State: they prefer building an underground network by bribing politicians, members of law enforcement. secret services, and even the judiciary sector. This network has allowed them to take root and consolidate their business in northern Italy. Bosses and

corrupt entrepreneurs have made their way with a barrage of bribes, promising votes in exchange of contracts and favors. The ways of organized crime are infinite. Like the Salerno-Reggio Calabria highway, which was never completed and which crumbled because of an earthquake, with 'ndrangheta arriving on the scene long before the first responders. Or those "consortiums" that make the lowest possible bids to win contracts, and the "groups of companies" used as a front to launder their massive cocainetrafficking revenues.

NICOLA GRATTERI is one most prominent magistrates in the fight against 'ndrangheta. He published several books with Mondadori, which were written with ANTONIO NICASO, a historian specialized in organized crime: Fratelli di sangue, La malapianta, La giustizia è una cosa seria, La mafia fa schifo, Dire e non dire, Acqua santissima, and Oro bianco.






