
## FERZAN OZPETEK Like a Breath

A touching and twisty short novel about memory and regret in Rome and Istanbul

On a Sunday morning Sergio and Giovanna have invited their best friends for lunch. While waiting for their guests, a stranger arrives at the door and asks to see the house. Elsa explains that she and her sister once lived there and that she came all the way from Istanbul. In her bag she carries a bundle of old letters to her sister Adele. All the letters were returned, unopened. Who is Elsa, that strange woman? Why didn't Adele open her letters? What explains Elsa's fascination with an ordinary kitchen window? In alternating chapters, we learn of the lives of the two sisters — and about the rift that separated them five decades ago. The book alternates Elsa's unread letters with Adele's present-day recollections. Only at the end do we understand how the two sisters, once in love with the same man, responded to an identical trauma in very different ways.

**FERZAN OZPETEK** director and screenwriter, born in Istanbul and living in Rome, is the author of the bestelling novels *Rosso Istanbul* (2013) and *Sei la mia vita* (2015).

# ALESSANDRA CARATI And Then We Will Be Safe

A girl running
away from a war and
her tenacious search

Aida is barely six years old when she flees her home with her mother. It is April 1992: the war is about to tear through the small Bosnian village where she was born. Thanks to a combination of savviness, unexpected help, and luck, Aida makes it to Milan and here she grows up quickly, in a foreign country, raised in the pain and confusion of that forced relocation, which overturned the lives of her parents and her entire family, in Italy and in Bosnia.

Even the arrival of her brother Ibro can't put their time back in order. As the years go by, she realizes that the subtle nostal-gia affecting her parents is an incurable disease: the house they stubbornly cling to and dream of returning to no longer exists. Tenaciously and alone, she finds a path to become an adult, at the cost of cutting herself off from her roots (abandoning her family and getting adopted by an Italian couple) and its atrocious consequences (her beloved brother's mental illness).

**ALESSANDRA CARATI** (40 years old) works in Milan as an editor and screenwriter. She lent her pen to Danilo Di Luca and Daniele Nardi for their best-selling books *Bestie da vittoria* (Piemme, 2016) and *La via perfetta* (Einaudi, 2019).

# GIANLUCA NATIVO Anyone Passing By

A sentimental education in Naples

Pierpaolo is twenty years old. He is an only child who lives with his parents in Naples. His father made his money dealing in speculations on the fringes of legality and gained a prominent position in the area. Pierpaolo is in his first year of med school, he is a good student, dedicated and methodical. He never went very far with girls and just realized that he is gay.


It is five in the morning, Pierpaolo is parked outside of his home with a friend he likes and one of them might be on the verge of coming out. Suddenly, the moment of intimacy is violated by the flashing blue lights of the police and he sees his father in hand-cuffs being led out of the building.

His own outward drive however prevails, pushing him to explore the city, sex, and love. It is the beginning of an increasingly audacious exploration of himself and his desires: he meets dozens of men in the streets of Naples, with encounters as exciting as they are disappointing. And hiding among them is the revolution of first love and maybe the hope of a different life from the one that other people imagined for him.

**GIANLUCA NATIVO** was born in Mugnano di Napoli in 1990. His short stories have been published in magazines and lit-blogs. He lives in Milan, where he teaches Italian in middle schools.

# GIUSEPPE CULICCHIA Time to Live with You

The story of a young terrorist, who was the author's cousin

Walter Alasia was twenty years old in 1976. He began his militancy at a very young age when got involved with Lotta Continua and then joined the Red Brigade. On the night between December 14 and 15, the police raided his parents' house to arrest him. He opened fire against the officers, killing two people. He then tried to escape but was gunned down by the police.

Culicchia was eleven years old at the time. Walter was much more than a cousin to him: he was the older brother he looked up to with admiration. He couldn't wait to spend the summer holidays with him, he was the one who taught him how to play basketball, who would put him on the handlebar of his bicycle, who drew cartoon characters for him. He was a role model.

In this brief and lean memoir, Culicchia reconstructs what he knew of Walter when he was a child, searching through his memories for the seeds of what would come to be. There is no victimization, there is no rhetoric, there is only an eleven-year-old's need to understand who the cousin he loved so much was, combined with the lucidity of a great writer who waited forty years to gain the awareness to tell this story.

GIUSEPPE CULICCHIA (born in Turin in 1965), a former bookseller, made his literary debut in 1994 with the hit *Tutti giù per terra*, translated in 10 languages and re-mixed in 2014. His last novels are *Essere Nanni Moretti* and *Il cuore e la tenebra*, both published by Mondadori.

# PAOLO NORI Still Bleeding

A heartbreaking, unforgettable portrait of Fëdor Dostoevskij


A novelised biography of Fëdor Dostoevskij, but at the same time a kind of autobiography of the author himself and of all the great number of readers, who were captured by Dostoevskij's world and couldn't leave it.

"Raskolnikov, the main character from Crime and Punishment, at a certain point asks himself: "Am I like an insect or like Napoleon?" Well, back when I was fifteen years old, I also asked myself that question: "What about me? Am I like an insect or like Napoleon?" I had a distinct feeling that book, published 112 years ago, opened up a wound in me that is still bleeding. Why? This book explores the incredible romanticized life of Fëdor Michajlovič Dostoevskij, an engineer without calling, a translator humiliated by his publishers, an aspiring revolutionary sentenced to death, pardoned, sent to Siberia, and then readmitted to Saint Petersburg, an incompetent and desperate player, a husband completely in love with a stenographer twenty-five years younger than him, a man with insignificant looks, old even when he was young, a sick and confused man who managed to die at the peak of his biggest success. Through the novelistic life of this man, these pages endeavor to become a novel by simply seeking to answer that question: Why? Why is that wound still bleeding?"

**PAOLO NORI** (born in Parma in 1963), a degree in Slavistic Studies, is the author of a long list of essays and novel, among them *I russi sono matti* (2019) and *Repertorio dei matti della letteratura russa* (2020). He also translated works by Puškin, Gogol', Turgenev, Tolstoj, Cechov, Dostoevskij.







Subhi gains a new sense of confidence with that outfit and daydreams about wearing it (despite the heat) to impress the girl of his dreams, the beautiful Shams.

But times are hard for love stories. The British just declared the end of their mandate in Palestine; Israeli forces bombard Jaffa, occupy it, and turn it into a ghost town. With the accords breached, hundreds of families flee, and their homes and orange groves are expropriated. In this theater of chaos and death, Subhi and Shams lose track of one another.


Berlin, 1930s. Erich, a Jewish boy who lost his mother, has a dream: he wants to tread the boards of cabaret theater. He is a step away from achieving it and also has the loving support of Anita, the girl he's always been in love with. Just when everything seems to be looking up for him, World War II breaks out and he is forced to flee the country. He moves to Amsterdam, but the Nazis soon take over the Netherlands. They capture Erich and send him to a prison camp, where he starts putting on cabaret shows with some of his old scene partners. After an insubordination, however, he is sent to Auschwitz as a punishment. He is exhausted and running on empty when a camp guard recognizes him from a show he had seen back in Berlin and forces him to perform for his tormentors. Erich would do anything to see the love of his life one last time, and she just so happens to be in the same concentration camp.

An exemplary tale inspired by many tragically real stories.



Remigia nurtures a dream of singing and dancing. She listens to Michael Jackson, Freddy Mercury, and her cousins' other musical idols. She willfully manages to get her parents to sign her up for singing lessons and eventually participates in a TV show for young singers. Because of a regrettable incident that happens to the host, however, that episode goes down in history as her Great Failure. A few years later she has the chance to redeem herself on prime-time television show. Having regained her courage and thanks to her first requited love, she will undertake the incredibly selective process to get into a dance academy...

The frail and free life of the violinist and composer Antonio Vivaldi





The enthralling novel of Antonio Vivaldi's life: a real rollercoaster of highs and lows. Born in Venice in 1678 in a large family with little means, he was a red-headed child, frail and sickly. He suffered from a respiratory disease that would accompany him for his entire life, and nobody expected him to live past the age of three. Instead, he survived and became a violin virtuoso at a very young age, studying music with brothers Benedetto and Alessandro Marcello. He was forced into priesthood when he was a child, gaining the nickname of "red priest," but he couldn't do away with music, so he kept on writing, becoming a librettist and a composer of concerts and operas. And it was in the theater that he met the only important woman in his life, the singer Anna Girò; they had an ambiguous and contentious relationship, and she inspired him to compose some of his most famous concerts, like The Four Seasons. He performed and was a guest at the most prominent courts in Europe, but he also fell out of grace several times. He ended up dying poor and unrecognized in Vienna, and was then forgotten for over a century.

EMANUELA FONTANA has been living in Rome for several years where she works as a journalist for Sole 24 ore and il Giornale, among others. This is her first novel.

## SERGIO DE SANTIS Caesar's Scribe

A highly informative and highly readable story



Aristocles grew up in Rome, where a couple of wealthy merchants bought him as a slave and a playmate for their son, a dimwitted bully nicknamed "Piglet." The son's tutor takes a liking to Aristocles, who learns how to read and write splendidly. He is barely twenty years old when he manages to free himself from slavery and receives a recommendation from his tutor that allows him to get employed by Caesar as his scribe. He admires his courage and strategy but he also can't help but notice the vanity and mystifications, the unscrupulousness with which he re-elaborates facts.

Aristocles' life changes once again in a surprising way when he is sent to Piacenza to visit an old friend of Caesar's. He is entrusted with the scrolls of his recently completed work, which will immortalize Caesar and his feats for posterity in what the entire world will come to know as *De Bello Gallico...*



It has been eight years since the last time Marco saw Lans, who just got out of jail and is now asking for his help. A girl was killed and the police is falsely accusing an ex-con, whom he believes to be innocent. He just needs a couple of favors, nothing illegal. But Marco, aka Arno in another life, feels that his friend is lying. He has two kids now and he doesn't want any trouble. The first favor, in fact, seems very illegal and dangerous: it involves getting into the victim's email and social media accounts in search of clues that would exonerate the suspect. For a computer genius like him, it should be child's play, right? The second favor doesn't bode well either: he would have to go to the prison for an interview. One step after the other, Arno finds himself mixed up in an investigation led by a most peculiar organization. The members, who meet at the exclusive Montecristo Club, fulfill some very strict and unusual requirements: they are the Mutineers, former prisoners. They turned their criminal pasts into their main virtue, allowing them to move like covert detectives looking for evidence to support victims of serious miscarriages of justice.



The world that awaits him there is profoundly different from Turin, where he grew up, and it doesn't take long for Ghibaudo to realize it: there are many crimes but few charges, indicating that in those lands, justice isn't settled in the rooms of the police station. So it comes as a surprise when Lianora, a recently widowed commoner, asks him for help. When the brigadier arrives at her house, he finds a dead body in her bedroom. After a closer look, he identifies him as one of his colleagues from the team that tried to rescue Lianora's deceased husband from bandits a few months prior. The suspicions fall on Anania, one of the family's farmhands, but some clues lead Ghibaudo to believe the truth lies elsewhere. And while a secret stirs in the brigadier's heart (which he will have to deal with for the rest of his life), someone starts killing off the so-called "poets on the fly," the street rhymers who wander from town to town.

One day, while finishing a climb on his first job, he receives a call: a group of hikers finds the body of a man buried under the snow. Who is the man? And how many years was he buried under the snow? Nanni knows that when the mountains return a broken life, they also return its story, its drama, its joys and dreams. It will be up to him to find answers and to discover what mysteries the man brought to the surface with him.

As ever in the Camanni's mysteries, the mountains are not just a mute backdrop but one of the main characters of the challenge Nanni Settembrini is called to take up.



### **ALESSANDRO MILAN** One Day I Will Tell the World

The much controversial trial of a man sentenced to death



This book explores the life and trials of Derek Rocco Barnabei, the Italian-American who was sentenced to death and executed in Virginia on September 14, 2000 for the murder and rape of seventeen-year-old Sarah Wisnosky. The famous criminal defense lawyer Alan Dershowitz, who offered his legal services pro bono, defined it "one of the most egregious miscarriages of justice I've ever seen." Many rallied in vain against that sentence, both in Italy and abroad.

The author conducted several interviews with Derek Rocco Barnabei and collaborated on two extraordinary sessions of live coverage directly from death row. It is a human encounter that he is personally invested in and affected by. Milan combines in his book the precision of a judicial investigation with an autobiographic narrative. He doesn't tackle the case from the perspective of someone who is fully convinced of his innocence, but rather someone who questions the death penalty and fights to get it abolished altogether. Barnabei's trial was controversial to say the least, but, aside from his guilt or innocence, the main question for Milan remains always fundamentally just one: is it right to sentence a human being to death?

ALESSANDRO MILAN (born in 1970), journalist, radio host for Radio24, is the author of the two bestsellers Mi Vivi Dentro and Due milioni di baci. He followed the Barnabei story at the time as a young reporter for Radio 24.

# FABRIZIO BENEDETTI The Memory Hunter

Four clinical cases that seem like real mysteries

As a neurophysiology professor, Fabrizio Benedetti has to explore people's minds and their memories. In certain ways, his job is similar to a detective's: starting with the information at hand, in fact, he often finds himself investigating in an empiric way, by trial and error, searching into the human mind, its deceptions, and its false memories.

This book presents four clinical cases that, by their very nature, seem like real mysteries. There is Sonia's story, a woman suffering from dementia; as her condition gets worse, she will reveal a dark secret from her past: but did it really happen or was it a false memory caused by her illness? Or also Magda's story, who is convinced she witnessed a tragic event while she was undergoing surgery: could it have been a case of awareness under anesthesia? It will be up to the doctor to assume the role of detective and scan the minds and memories of his patients in search of a possible truth.

**FABRIZIO BENEDETTI** is a professor of Neurophysiology and Human Physiology at the University of Turin. He is one of the world's leading experts in the placebo effects and the author of *Placebo Effects* and *The Patient's Brain*, both published by Oxford University Press. With Mondadori he published in 2018 *La speranza è un farmaco*.

Not many people know it, but senology was born in Italy. It developed from the quadrantectomy studies carried out in the Seventies at the European Institute of Oncology founded by Umberto Veronesi, where Alberto Luini has been the right-hand man for thirty years. The author takes us on a journey to reveal this organ, its morphology, and its anatomy. We will discover how breasts grow, how they evolve in the various stages of a woman's life, what happens to them during menopause, and, finally, how they get sick, the types of cancers that affect them, and the most innovative therapies to treat them. To this end, Luini underscores the importance of prevention, which involves undergoing regular clinical screenings; but he also emphasizes above all the importance of leading a healthy life, far from the enemies of breasts, like alcohol, smoking, stress, and being overweight. The objective is to focus on the psychophysical balance, on the harmony of body and mind: not only is it important when breasts get sick, it is especially so after therapeutic interventions to treat them, when it becomes fundamental to heal from the "outside" as well as from the "inside."

**ALBERTO LUINI** is a breast surgeon at the European Institute of Oncology founded by Prof. Umberto Veronesi. He was directly involved in Veronesi's main studies on breast surgery, and he created with his colleague Giovanni Paganelli the ROLL technique for non-palpable lesions (which was adopted world-wide).

The ideal approach is empathy: to take advantage of the beneficial virtues of green beans, cabbages, and carrots, and also enhance their qualities at the dinner table, you have to "put yourself in their shoes." You have to know their nature and their "character." You have to respect their seasonality and harvest times, where they come from, their cultivation systems and conservation methods. The author accompanies us on an unusual path to discover the world of vegetables, investigating the territory with the curiosity of an explorer and revealing to us its colors, scents, and secrets. 




