

La strada giovane / The Young Road

Nino, a young Sicilian baker, is captured after September 8, 1943. He doesn't fully understand the meaning of the armistice; he thought the Germans would send him back to his family in the Madonie Mountains. Instead, the train takes him to a prison camp in Austria, where he endures hunger, cold, and fear. Nino is an IMI—an Italian Military Internee—deprived even of the basic rights of a prisoner. Some comfort comes from his friendship with Lorenzo, a cultured and outgoing young man from Tuscany, who works alongside him in kitchens overseen by the Piedmontese, a towering butcher. Together, the three seize the chaos of New Year's Eve 1944 celebrations as their chance to escape. But outside, the cold, hunger, and fear are just as relentless. Navigating is no simple task; finding food and shelter is a constant struggle, and the people they encounter are terrified and ruthless. Sicily feels unreachable, and mile after mile, Nino sheds his innocence and youth. Still, what sustains him through his seemingly endless journey across Nazi-occupied territories—where partisan bands fight on and bombings continue and later through the devastation of a southern Italy ravaged by the advancing Allies, is the memory of beauty and the warmth of love. As he feeds on red snails emerging from the ground after the rain, his memories surface as well: the feast of the saint at Ferragosto, the scent of butter and vanilla from his father's cookies, the taste of stewed babaluci, the thrill of the Targa Florio, the famous car race. And the warmth of Maria Assunta's kisses—Maria Assunta, who may still be waiting for him and whom he longs to embrace again at all costs. The Young Road is the debut novel by Antonio Albanese, revealing his talent for a gripping, at times dramatic narrative, tinged with tenderness. Nino is a heart-wrenching and profoundly authentic protagonist, impossible not to fall in love with.

"Every year, a thousand people around the world lose their lives due to a lightning strike. I am not one of them." This is how the story of Anna begins, who grows up with her father in her grandmother's country house. Orphaned of a brother, with an absent mother, a failed father, and a grandmother who is both an artist and a gambling addict, Anna convinces herself that surviving a lightning strike means she is different and destined for great things.

And yet, at twenty-four, she still hasn't found her direction and feels out of place everywhere. Things change when her grandmother dies: Anna and her father discover that the property had been sold sixteen years earlier and that they must vacate the house within a few weeks. So they decide to hide her death, buy some time, and, in the meantime, sell off the little they have inherited. But when it's time to present her grandmother's paintings, Anna passes them off as her own. And it is from this lie that many others soon follow. Anna finds herself in Milan, surrounded by artists and influencers convinced that she is one of them. Although at first, Anna manages to keep her unease in check, the domino effect of her choices and her father's is always on the verge of overwhelming their lives. Things finally spiral out of control when the legitimate owner of the house, indebted and hounded by loan sharks, discovers the deception. Anna and Vincenzo must then confront their fears and the image they have built around themselves. Not Out Of Malice is the debut of a fierce and ironic writer, capable of telling a story that is as grotesque as it is real. A novel that truly strikes like unexpected lightning. A talent outside the box, original, far from stereotypes and conventions. And one that marks a new path where youth


and literary wisdom end up traveling in the same direction.

Marco is a renowned Milanese actor on the decline. The films he used to star in won Oscars, but now he plays "prestigious" roles as a corpse in B-movies. When he's not lying in a coffin waiting for a cue, he takes long, solitary walks filled with memories. The only spark in his life comes from Luciana, the "sadomasomasterchef" who enjoys sexual games involving mustard seeds.

Mirko is a dazed young man from the province of Lecce. Having arrived in Rome in search of fortune, he became a star simply by putting his name on a billboard. Now, however, he can't fathom why he's achieved such success; it seems to him that his reality is an absurd novel written by an invisible hand.

Marco wants to disappear, Mirko wants to appear. The former comes from the North, the latter is a son of the South. One is of a certain age with a good dose of regrets, while the other has a future ahead and a fame he can't manage.

Their destinies brush against each other multiple times before intersecting in a crescendo of amusing and mad situations: from the ramblings of the bumbling agent Nando, who represents them both, to a shared flirtation with the mysterious Lara, to a gang of jealous brothers with a license to kill. Ultimately, a bizarre will shuffles the cards and reveals some secrets from the past.

Comic and irreverent, yet also introspective and visionary. Shifting with happy ease from one tone to another, Claudio Bisio offers us a novel rich in lucid madness, with a surprising ending that will make you want to read it all over again.

di Lampedusa, author of the literary masterpiece *The Leopard*, was an author in her own right: of a novel of which only a few pages remain. Here she comes alive again in this vivid and stylish historical novel.

May 1943. In a deserted Palermo, suspended in silence, a woman steps resolutely through the war's rubble. Her elegant dress contrasts with the gutted buildings, the streets made impassable by deep chasms and floods. Walking through a web of alleys, she reaches a magnificent eighteenth-century building enveloped in a cloud of dust from the violence of an Allied bombing. The woman is Beatrice Tasca di Cutò, the princess of Lampedusa. She has just arrived from Capo d'Orlando, where she'd taken refuge to escape the fury of war on Palermo, but her home lured her back. To stay.

Camped out in the palazzo's crumbling stables, Beatrice must find food and drink and face down the vagrants who take pleasure in the destruction of her house.

Eugenia, the twenty-year-old daughter of a well-known lawyer in the city, spies on Beatrice. Eugenia is amazed by the aristocratic woman's resolve and by her sensual attachment to her war-torn house. Before long, the two women have met. Despite some suspicion and resistance, the princess establishes an unprecedented complicity with Eugenia. One night, she confesses to the girl that in her refuge in Capo d'Orlando she started writing a novel called *The Eclipse*. The story is based on the decline of an era and a class, the aristocracy. Beatrice then begins to talk about her son, Giuseppe Tomasi, displaced with his wife to the countryside of Capo d'Orlando. Meanwhile, with the help of Eugenia, the princess plans the last grand ball in Sicilian history: a reception at Palazzo Lampedusa, with invitations extended to all the noble families. It is a singular, daring, unscrupulous proposal for a final ball under the bombs.

Un sogno così / A Dream Like This

In Milan, 1952, spring arrives sweet and insistent. Carlo, just over twenty, races through the peripheral Giambellino district on his Lambretta, weaving between wild meadows and buildings under construction, caught between the energy of post-war rebirth and lingering scars of the conflict. During those years of hunger and bombings, his family had become impromptu merchants. They survived, which was already a great feat. But now Carlo has bigger plans: he will open a hardware store, and within those few square meters, he will build—one nail, one screw, one bolt at a time—his small miracle in the whirlwind of Italy's upcoming economic boom. Meanwhile, America draws closer: televisions begin entering living rooms, the city opens its first supermarket, traffic lights appear, and cars multiply, ready to race along roads that did not exist before. A profound sense of freedom grows whether it's the freedom to spend a day at the seaside to savor the immeasurable beauty of one's land, to make a kind of music one's own, or to taste the budding culture flourishing with newfound resources. It is a time of intense and practical industriousness, filled with work but intertwined with deep emotions. With love: like Carlo's love for Liliananaïve and delicate, transparent and spontaneous, able to be a wife and mother in a new, freer, and happier way. The world presses and stirs around this young couple, teeming with hopes, promises, and epochal transformations, as well as subtle, almost invisible changes, all worthy of remembrance—parts of a future that turns into the present, day by day. In the private arc of one family—his own—Paolo Colombo paints an epic within the larger canvas of Italy's collective history: with its miseries, redemptions, and, more often than we might think, flashes of grandeur. And everything—absolutely everything—matters, because every piece contributes to the construction of what we once were, what we are, and what we might still become.



ROBERTO COTRONEO

lives and works in Rome. He has published many novels, including *Presto con fuoco* (1995, Campiello Selection Prize, Fiesole Prize), *Otranto* (1997), *Questo amore* (2006), *Il vento dell'odio* (2008), *Niente di personale* (2018), *Loro* (2021), and La cerimonia dell'addio (2023). La nebbia e il fuoco / The Fog And The Fire

Under the ashen gray sky of Alessandria, the narrator encounters Gepi, an old friend who approaches him, pushing his bicycle. With the casual indifference typical of the city, Gepi drops a startling detail during their chat: Aldo, the beloved and highly respected high school English teacher, had been a member of the GAP (Patriotic Action Groups) of Piazza Mentana during the Resistance, one of the first such groups to form in Italy. "Oh, he was a hothead," Gepi continues. "They say he took part in a mission where a colonel was killed. Even though it was only supposed to be a demonstration. But things turned out differently. Aldo was nineteen." This revelation sparks a journey into memory—both historical and personal—for the narrator, who left Alessandria many years ago and has since become a writer and intellectual. In a city devoid of heroics and almost without mysteries, Aldo's past remains elusive. Was he truly part of that mission? Was he the man Pansa described in La Guerra Partigiana—the one who never threw his grenade? Reconstructing the truth with certainty seems impossible. Yet, for the former student, the ultimate goal is not discovering the absolute truth but retracing the paths of memory to uncover the memory of those places. It is this transmission of a non-rhetorical memory, rooted in Aldo's non-ideological teachings, that lies at the heart of Cotroneo's investigation in *The Fog and the Fire*. A memory shaped by the education of independent critical thought. "If I think of someone like Aldo today," Cotroneo writes, "I see him as part of a different anthropology altogether. Those men were a different species. Narcissism seemed yet unborn. Aldo never wrote anything, likely for this reason: silence, doubt, and respect. Teaching is far more patriotic than singing an anthem at the top of your lungs with your hand on your heart."

is a journalist and writer; a long-time columnist for the daily newspaper La Repubblica, she has worked for Clarín, El País, and served as the director of L'Unità from 2008 to 2011. She has created and hosted radio and TV programs, including Cactus, Fuoriroma, and Pane quotidiano. Among her publications, notable works in-

Di madre in figlia / From Mother to Daughter

What isolates you saves you, but what puts you in danger is life. Marilù lives at the top of an island: below there is the village, in the middle the forest, and finally the clearing with her house. where even the frequent summer fires cannot reach her. She is a woman who fascinates but also somewhat scares, because she carries with her the fact of having been very free during the freest years of the last century, the psychedelic seventies. Too much, thinks her daughter Angela, who feels she has received nothing from her but neglect. Now, Angela finds herself reluctantly forced to entrust her daughter Adelaide – who prefers to be called Adè – to her for three months. Adè is an adolescent, as curious online as she is insecure outside of it and in her own body.

In this long summer, grandmother and granddaughter find themselves together after ten years, while the mother interrupts with anxious phone calls on the home landline, because, first thing, Marilù has confiscated the girl's cell phone. For Adè, the vacation couldn't have started worse; she fears it will be hell, but instead, little by little, it turns into an adventure. There is a secret that the grandmother does not want to talk about, something that concerns her family history, the maternal line that precedes her – her mother, the village pharmacist, and her grandmother, now a ninety-year-old herbalist – and two men who have loved her. What do they all have to do with the fires? On the delicate line between loving, protecting, and letting go, between caring and poisoning, the three women, from mother to daughter, try to understand each other, not to diminish the difficulty of the lives of the others - Adè's insomnia, Angela's anxieties, and her resentment towards her mother, Marilù's secret – even though the temptation is strong, even though sometimes resentment, pain, and love blind them. Concita De Gregorio intertwines three generations, three historical eras, and three seasons of life in the voices of Marilù, Angela, and Adè: immediately so real, so vulnerable, and alive that they immediately

Fairy tales of eagle country tell of donkeys, apple trees, operations to save a crazy girl with a ponytail, and leaves that once planted can sprout not only garlic and onions but houses as well. Eagle country is the happiest country there is. Even if there is no running water, even if there are more bunkers than cows, even if Ari's mother left her at her grandparents' because she got pregnant when she was too young to work, and even if when the Berlin Wall falls, so much for an immediate end to dictatorship: in eagle country there is only disorder and murder and men with their faces covered. Of course, when the Berlin Wall falls, many leave for Italy. heading to the opposite shore to the land of eagles, the happiest place of all. But Ari and her grandparents do not leave. The grandparents feel too old to do so, whereas Ari waits for her mother to come back for her. Her mother, in fact, has left on the same ship that everyone else took. There are two Aris in this novel: one is the little girl who lives in Albania in the 1990s, and she is shoeless, because shoes are not to be worn out and therefore you go barefoot; and the other is a young woman who has a lot of shoes, as well as running water, and now lives in downtown Milan, in a fancy apartment, spending hours in the shower because organic shampoos do not lather enough. The two look alike, partly because they are beautiful and beauty is all the same, and partly because they are the

Anita Likmeta, with tenderness and irony, with cheerfulness and great ruthlessness, tells us about a childhood where, sometimes, peeing your pants was the only way to get warm, and a youth full of warmth where your childhood does not make you a martyr nor a hero, but helps you to never be afraid of anything.

LUIGI PAVONE



This is a story of despair and hope.


Its protagonist is young Peacock, born during a heavy snowfall on the eve of the most important match for his hometown team: Campobasso vs. Juve, 1–0. And no, not the one from Turin. He is a boy who grew up in the provinces in the late '90s. Mummy and Daddy scold him and his brother Gregory, while on TV, the Gallagher brothers are singing *Don't Look Back in Anger* and the Coffee & TV music video by Blur plays, with the little milk carton lost in the big city.

There are loves that begin and loves that wither, and there are friends who will be friends forever, even when the music stops playing. Because this is also the story of Luigi Pavone, who chases away dark thoughts with the dream of becoming a writer. And so he tells the story of young Peacock until he merges with his own character, getting lost in the maze of his own pages, with a dense, dazzling, rock'n'roll style of writing that sways the reader like a concert crowd. But it's also a disorienting kind of writing—one that, in its constant shifts from Luigi to Peacock and back again, paints a sophisticated and profound existential duel. When the author's emotional tangle tightens, his sentences become fragments, and punctuation dissolves until it vanishes—perhaps because, in pain, even the space to catch one's breath disappears. Luigi Pavone tells Peacock's story in the book you hold in your hands. Then, one day, he decides to step off the stage.

"Books cannot die—the real ones, the ones that hold so much life. Luigi Pavone gave up his own life and, at the same time, saved it. He took his youth, his joy, his pain, and gave them a stunning body of irreverent, dazzling, and free words.

Reading Babies means touching his soul, feeling an overwhelming jolt, and clinging even more to this imperfect world, to our flawed humanity. It means silently thanking him and holding on to his voice, keeping it here just a little longer."

Tender, elegant and intense. This is how one can define this sentimental autobiography by Sandra Petrignani. A life told through all the dogs, and they were many, with whom she shared childhood. youth and adulthood. Is it possible to look back over one's own life through the eyes of these animals that one has loved so strongly? Written with a rare lightness and grace, this book shows that it is not only possible but necessary, for this author at least. Through her love for her dogs, Sandra Petrignani manages to cast an unprecedented light on her life's passions: above all love, but also friendship, literature, poetry. In this book country landscapes alternate with city stories. And stories of writing and love for companions and husbands, all of whom have found their lives intertwined with those of the dogs. The result is a beautiful, authentic text, stunning in some respects. showing strength and fragility, tenderness and awareness. A book that has a poignant sweetness, that comforts us, amuses us and makes us think. Both for those who have never had the good fortune and privilege of growing up with a dog, as well as for those who know how important this can be, important even to becoming a writer.



Troncamacchioni / Trailblazers

"Here you will find the ragged epic of the dispossessed who cannot afford the luxury of inner emotions, the story of the last who have made history. The protagonists of these pages, if they shine, it is due to the quartz of their granite teeth. If their skin changes color, it is because a wound bleeds like a vein of hematite crystal. And when they are close, they spark, like sulfur when it meets pyrite."

Domenico Marchettini, known as 'the Curl,' 'a porter prone to brawling and foul language.' Giuseppe Maggiori, a taciturn, illiterate miner. And then there's Robusto Biancani, a sensitive and dreamy-looking communist cobbler, and Albano Innocenti, also a communist, 'a fermenter of disorder,' Characters rarely found in history books, unless lumped together in faceless collective entities like 'the masses,' 'the proletariat,' 'the people.' These, along with their comrades, mothers, sisters, and companions, are the protagonists of the counter-epic whose praise is sung in this book. It's the story of irregular men and women in the Alta Maremma, in Tuscany, at the dawn of fascism: anarchists and bandits, deserters and communists, unruly figures who did not find a straight, clear path ahead but were forced to forge ahead through the coppice—'among the holm oaks, broom, chestnut groves, and thickets, with hearts in their throats and lips cracked'—constantly fleeing from the authorities, fascist thugs, and informers ready to betray their neighbors in exchange for a few coins. The rebellious spirit of miners and peasants who have nothing to lose but refuse to give up their ideas, to yield, to give their consent, pushes forward with blows of knives, sticks, but also with improvised verses in ottava rima. And from the hills of Maremma, it reaches as far as France, Belgium, and Russia.

Amianto (2023)



GIÒ STAJANO

Born in 1931 in Sannicola, Puglia, Giò Stajano was one of the first public figures in Italy to openly live her transgender identity, leaving an indelible mark on 20th-century culture and society. The granddaughter of the fascist leader Achille Starace, Giò challenged the conventions of her time with her irreverent and non-conformist spirit. In the 1950s and 1960s, she made a name for her-

self as a journalist and writer, publishing *Roma capovolta*, a scandalous novel. Her personal story, marked by the struggle for self-determination, culminated in the 1980s with her gender transition, which she documented in her autobiographical book *La mia vita scandalosa*. A symbol of freedom and courage, she passed away in 2011, leaving a legacy of authenticity and rebellion.

Roma capovolta / Rome Turned Upside Down

In 1931, Mussolini had been ruling Italy for nine years. Near Lecce, Giò Stajano was born, his full name being Gioacchino Stajano Starace Briganti di Panico. His father was Count Stajano Briganti di Panico. a noble feudal lord from Salento. His mother was the daughter of Achille Starace, secretary of the National Fascist Party, who ended up hanged in Piazzale Loreto along with Mussolini and Petacci, Legend has it that little Giò, when taken in Mussolini's arms at Villa Borghese, urinated on him. Giò Stajano was the first man in Italy to publicly declare his homosexuality. He did so with Roma capovolta, an autobiographical novel published in 1959 by the Quattrucci publisher. The book was immediately seized for promoting ideas "contrary to public morals and dangerous to customs." The seized copies were burned in the square. Roma capovolta tells the adventures, loves, and disappointments of a group of homosexual boys, their escapades, and their forays into the wild and scandalous habits of Roman high society. Against this backdrop is Italy, depicted in Dino Risi's Il Sorpasso, a hypocritical and puritanical country emerging from the post-war period to take the leap into the economic boom. Thus, Stajano became "the most famous homosexual in Italy." He entered the Roman film industry jet set, once took a bath in the Barcaccia fountain, and inspired the most famous scene in Fellini's La dolce vita. He worked with Risi, Steno, and Riccardo Freda.



IRINA TURCANU

born in 1984 in Gura Humorului, in Northern Romania, has lived in Italy since 2001,

where she collaborates with national and local newspapers and magazines.

There's No Sunshine, But We're Fine is a story told through the eyes of Ina, who observes a family—her own—that believes itself to be sheltered from the grand sweep of history, from the social plagues that arise as a reaction to the unhappiness of the many, of all. After the fall of the communist regime, the Romanian couple, the Rubanencus, are captivated by democracy and the freedom of commerce and attempt the path of entrepreneurship.

They fail. They try to reinvent themselves by moving to a different city. But living decently in a country in decline is tough. Thus, the idea of escape is born, leaving behind their certainties to offer something different, something better, to themselves and to Ina, the little girl who has now become a teenager. From the outside, Italy is the promised land: all the Rubanencus' savings are poured into this obsession. However, adapting to a new world requires a great effort. It's like being reborn and stepping into a second life with the burden of the previous one. The father collapses. The mother endures. The daughter bears the burden of new opportunities.

It's a story where, even if the sun is missing, just like in a poem by George Coşbuc that connects Ina and her father, somehow, for some time, they manage to be okay anyway.

La levatrice di Nagyrév / The Midwife Of Nagyrév

Zsigmond Danielovitz, tasked with investigating the corpse of an elderly peasant woman, is a man weakened by war but sharp-eyed. It doesn't take him long to notice something sinister behind the eyes of the inhabitants of Nagyrév. Nagyrév is a small village lost in the Hungarian plains, the year is 1929, and prosperity has not reached this close-knit rural community. Danielovitz soon realizes that the woman's death on the banks of the Tisza River is just one link in a long chain of disappearances and accidents that have plagued the village for some time. The Midwife of Nagyrév recounts a true crime story that occurred between the two world wars, an event that shocked Europe not only because of the gruesomeness of the crimes but also for an unprecedented reversal of roles: women kill men, seeking revenge. Superstition, violence, poverty, and abuse dominate the lives intertwined in this rural tableau, where women always bear the brunt of others' desires and frustrations. The patriarchal rules of the Hungarian community and the pettiness of the human spirit create unbearable situations and unjustifiable suffering for wives and daughters, the elderly and young girls. At the center of Nagyrév's stories is the enigmatic Zsuzsanna, a midwife with a shadowy past, often labeled a "witch" by her fellow villagers—feared, occasionally respected, and a charismatic figure. She is a rare example of an emancipated woman to whom many "sisters" turn for help to resolve the troubles they face at home. Burdened by deceit, rape, and subjugation, these victims have decided to stand up for themselves. The events of Nagyrév, exposing the horrors of domestic life and the forms of resistance against gender oppression, offer a painful yet valuable lens through which to understand the present.




Anita / Anita



Elisa Capano, better known as Eli in Crimeland, has a YouTube channel that has garnered millions of views, where she reconstructs international mysteries and cold cases. February 22, 1975, Rome. Some hooded men burst into a post office a few steps from the Pantheon. An on-duty policeman shoots, but the robbers are faster and kill him. One dead and a loot that is smaller than expected. In the days that follow, the murdered officer's future wife takes her own life. All the newspapers report on the heist. The robbery is a disaster. Evidence must be concealed and witnesses eliminated. The heist was organized by a group of criminals who were little known but very experienced. They call themselves "I Marsigliesi", mobsters wanted in half of Europe, and, a few years earlier, one of them pulled off the "heist of the century" at a jewelry store on Via Montenapoleone, right under the nose of the Milan central police station. In Rome, in a very short time, they succeeded in transforming crime in the capital, monopolizing kidnappings, drug trafficking and prostitution rings. They will also weave a dense network of contacts with the Mafia, the secret services, the extreme right and the Church. It is no coincidence that a very young Danilo Abbruciati cut his teeth in the Marsigliesi. Abbruciati is now considered one of the founding fathers of the Banda della Magliana, the most powerful criminal organization that Rome has seen in centuries, which rose to prominence in the mid-70s.

La governante / The Housekeeper

The woman at the center of this novel has chosen to leave behind a promising career for a seemingly modest job. She says this aloud as she cooks. La cattiva terra / Bad Land

Waste is worth a fortune. It's the new gold. And so, on a chilly February morning in 1987, Carabinieri Marshal Giovanni Piconese and Brigadier Giacomo Zanella find themselves at the Priabona pass in the Altovicentino region, investigating the murder of a truck driver transporting toxic waste.

To unravel a mystery that resembles a game of mirrors, the sharp mind of Piconese is needed. He's a provincial Maigret with a cigarette instead of a pipe, possessing the same knack for understanding others' psychology, and a wife and four children waiting for him at home. What do the ghosts of the ancient bandits, rebels against the Serenissima Republic of Venice, have to do with a shadowy organization that illegally disposes of waste? Author of popular novels set in the Triveneto region, Umberto Matino tells of identities that arise across elusive borders and are nourished by the intertwining of different cultures. Bad Land explores one of the many faces of the Northeast, the engine of Italy, cradle of both genuine and false homelands, and a generation of "entrepreneurs" who have only one credo: money.



Are we the ones who choose the trees? Or are the trees the ones who choose which human to accompany through the stages of their life? Or, better yet, aren't the trees perhaps the ones who can tell the story of humans' journey on earth?

The mulberry tree of Jerusalem, the bent pine of Mount Nebo, the olive trees of Bethlehem, the sycamores of Gaza, and the ficus trees of the Palermo Botanical Garden, and then the plane trees of Gezi Park and the flame trees of Cairo are not only witnesses to human history but, in their own way, write history.

This is how Paola Caridi introduces and narrates the stories behind the most symbolic trees—and botanical gardens—of the Middle East and the Mediterranean. And with these stories—surprising, personal, political, and tragic—she also brings to life the stories of the men and women who have chosen to inhabit the land where these trees have taken root. Somewhere between memoir and the history of areas in Italy and the Mediterranean that have endured a double colonization—of the people, and within the human species, of those who have exercised indiscriminate, unchecked power over the land and the landscape—The Mulberry Tree of Jerusalem overturns our usual perspective on understanding the other. It helps us to examine in new ways the silent and powerless witnesses to the crucial passages in world events. This is history, a piece of history, told by the trees.

ENRICO DEAGLIO

C'era una volta in Italia. Gli anni settanta / Once Upon a Time in Italy. The Seventies

Where were we? At the explosion of that bomb in Milan that marked the end of the "innocent" and "fabulous" Sixties. A new decade was beginning, and the future had changed hands. The Seventies, the second volume of a broader Italian history that continues to the present day, remain vivid in memory and turbulence: alongside significant and rapid political changes (the rise of the Italian Communist Party) and social transformations (laws on abortion and divorce, the closure of asylums, and conscientious objection), the decade witnessed a dramatic turn toward violence, later known as the "Years of Lead." Right-wing extremists planted bombs in trains, stations, and universities while preparing numerous coups d'état. Criminal groups—such as the Banda della Magliana, Cosa Nostra, the P2 lodge, and the then-unknown 'Ndrangheta—aligned themselves with power, carrying out "dirty work." Meanwhile, parts of the revolutionary left chose the path of armed struggle, with unforeseen, bloody, and unmatched results in Europe. And as civil life reached unprecedented levels of degradation, 387 people were kidnapped. The ransoms collected by the Anonima Sequestri shaped the country's "development model." In the Seventies, we marched with Berlinguer, Pannella, Franca Rame, and Dario Fo. We attended too many civil funerals, demonstrated for women's rights and against war, danced the Tuca Tuca by Raffaella Carrà, grew up reading History by Elsa Morante, and sang to the tunes of Rino Gaetano, Lucio Dalla, and Francesco De Gregori. In the cinema, we laughed bitterly with Fantozzi; Gian Maria Volonté became the face of political commitment; Fellini won an Oscar with Amarcord; and the bawdy jokes of Amici miei were imitated in train stations. Jobs were becoming scarce, students were beginning to contemplate their futures, and the country was shaken by terror from massacres, kidnappings, and bombs. The world seemed split between those who wanted to change everything and those clinging tooth and nail to the old order. Then, little by little, hope gave way to disillusionment: the dream of revolution collided with the violence in the streets. Pier Paolo Pasolini and Peppino Impastato were gone, many young people were killed, and Aldo Moro was abandoned and left to die. The Seventies ended with the sense that something had broken, that the possible future had drifted away for good. And yet, it was during that time that we learned what it meant to fight, to love, and to believe in a different world—if only for a while.



Sotto la pelle del mondo / Under the Skin of the World

We are living in a phase of contested hegemony. Antagonists are openly challenging U.S. primacy without fear of Washington's retaliation: the Russians have invaded Ukraine, bringing war back to Europe; the Iranians are striking Israel via Hamas; the Chinese are offering diplomatic and financial support to Moscow and Tehran, while reminding us with every military exercise that Taiwan must return to them, by peaceful means or force. To navigate this complex landscape, we need to immerse ourselves in the world and understand it with new tools. But how?

Dario Fabbri guides us by applying the method of human geopolitics to contemporary issues. What does this involve? It consists of studying the interaction between collectives situated in geographic space through the perspective of others, using human aggregations—tribes, city-states, communes—as the prism of history, rather than focusing on individual actors.

By relating these collectives to one another, we can fully understand the evolving reasons behind the Russian people, the changes within German and Israeli societies, the viewpoints of Turks and Persians, the contradictions of Modi's India, the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, the rationale behind Brexit, and the static homogeneity of Italy. These contemporary issues have deeper causes than we might imagine and share many common elements. They will influence our lives for years to come. Fabbri reveals to readers the difference between what appears on the surface and the true substance of these phenomena.





Giangiacomo Feltrinelli was one of the most arresting and characterful figures of his generation, a man with "his head in the clouds and his feet on the ground." This memoir by his son, Carlo, retraces an extraordinary life, whose beginnings were far more certain than its violent end. He was born in Milan in 1926, the son of one of the wealthiest men in Italy. His father was a financier and industrialist, his mother a banker's daughter. They travelled the world and dined with kings and noblemen. Feltrinelli is now most often associated with the publishing house that he founded, which was the first to publish two of the great post-war novels, Boris Pasternak's Dr Zhivago and The Leopard by Giuseppe Tomasi di Lampedusa. But his life contained so many other episodes, including a period of militancy in the PCI, a honeymoon in Baja California and Zihuatanejo on Mexico's Pacific Coast, expeditions south to Africa, north to the Trondheim fjord, ping-pong with Henry Miller, basketball with Fidel Castro, the first interview of Yasser Arafat, and much more, all of which is set against its historical and political context (the "terrible" 1956, the Vietnam war, 1968, the Piazza Fontana bombing) and recounted with great verve in this remarkable book.



Every era has its catastrophisms. It is striking how similar the prophecies are, even centuries or millennia apart. One could say they are part of the DNA of our species. All civilizations, all religions, from China, India, Mesopotamia, to ancient Greece, have their myths, and almost all have a flood or another cataclysm, from which life is reborn. Creation, destruction, transformation are complementary, inextricably linked to each other. But perhaps no one has predicted and lamented disasters, devastations, massacres, genocides, as well and poetically as the prophets of Israel. Perhaps no era is without melancholy, without a deep individual sadness, without inner torment, a pain of the soul. However, there is an era in which melancholy ceases to be a simple personal feeling and becomes the fundamental trait of life: modernity. It is only in the modern world, in fact, that melancholy is accompanied by a radical loss of meaning in the world. Why this outcome? Why, in the age of desire, action. technology, and generalized production, does melancholy spread like an epidemic? Why, from the last two centuries—and particularly in the 20th century—has melancholy ceased to be a purely "personal" phenomenon and instead become a social, cultural, historical, and even metaphysical event? These are the questions that *Melancholy and the End of the* World explores, as Paolo Godani guides readers on a dizzying journey in search of fundamental concepts such as the body, finitude, and the living being. Modernity is the era in which every being is conceived as a finite, ephemeral living entity, constantly besieged by the threat of dissolution and death, and engaged in perpetual struggle with other entities for survival. For such an entity, "life" replaces the ancient concepts of "being" and "nature."

Existence, which in the premodern world was understood as belonging to the eternity of the cosmos, becomes isolated from the whole and confined to its finitude, its mortal corporeality. From this arises the typically modern feeling of melancholy, shaped by the belief that each of us essentially lives within ourselves, separated from the whole, driven by tendencies or impulses that define our uniqueness and constantly expose us to the perception of a meaningless world.

He co-founded the journalism group

River Journal Project, a multimedia account of current issues through the world's great rivers. He collaborates with Internazionale, L'Espresso, Rai, Sky Italia, Harper's, Reportagen, Revue XXI, Le Temps, Neue Zürcher Zeitung. He is among the journalists affiliated with the Pulitzer Center in Washington. In addition he was deputy editor of Io Donna, Corriere della Sera's supplement, for seven years.



A fuoco / On Fire

Climate change is the most difficult challenge humanity has ever faced. Gianluca Grimalda, a social science researcher and climate activist, offers his perspective on the issue through his latest "slow-travel," during which he traveled from Bougainville Island in the Solomon Islands to Germany over 72 days, avoiding air travel to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. After traveling 28,000 km by ship, train, bus, truck, and taxi, with 650 hours of actual travel and an estimated reduction of 5 tons of CO2 emissions, Grimalda experienced firsthand—and "focused on"—how the populations he encountered are experiencing and adapting to climate change. For the past thirteen years, Grimalda has chosen to travel using low-carbon-emission transport. After a period of research at the Kiel Institute for World Economy, he planned to return to Europe without flying, but the German institute first requested his immediate return and then, on October 11, 2023, after his refusal, sent him an official dismissal letter. A Fuoco is the story of that journey and an analysis of climate change and its social transformations. But it is also a call for a new awareness among people worldwide.



Volga Blues / Volga Blues

Heralded by Harper's, the prestigious American magazine that dedicated its cover to this story, and already a candidate in the reportage section for the Pulitzer Prize, Volga Blues is the account of the extraordinary journey, made in 2023, in the second year of the war in Ukraine, by Marzio G. Mian along the banks of the Volga. A journey through Russian history: where it all began, where the Tsarist empire was born, where the Soviet empire was established with the Battle of Stalingrad and Stalin's forced industrialization, and where now post-Soviet autocracy and Vladimir Putin's neo-imperial project reigns.

A reportage discovering the true heart of today's Russia, reactionary Eurasist thinking, nostalgia for the Soviet period and Stalinism, as well as the rebirth of God, the ideological and spiritual centrality of the Orthodox Church and the reappearance of Old Believers, the most radical religious ideology in the anti-Western offensive. Russia, seen from the West, is today a distant, mysterious, hostile land. After the invasion of Ukraine, an even thicker darkness shrouds it than in Soviet times. Defying the paranoid controls of the security services, Marzio G. Mian managed to travel six thousand kilometers into the belly, heart and soul of today's Russia. Following the Volga River, the "homeland" of the Tatars, Cossacks, monk-saints, shamans, Pugachev and Lenin, Mian went in search of archaic and rural Russia, metropolitan Russia and the great spaces full of nothing; of the Russia of steppes and sunflowers, of sovkhoz, factories, izbas, of the most reactionary traditions and the most ruthless revolutions, of miracles and repressions. It is where Europe and Asia meet or divide, depending on whether the compass of history points East or West.

Traveling from North to South, from its source in the Valdaj region between St. Petersburg and Moscow to Astrakan on the Caspian Sea, Mian reveals, in this unique reportage, the "other front" of the fierce ongoing clash with the West, the front of people made up of many nations and held together by the brutal and ancient dream of an imperial civilization.



ALESSANDRA NECCI

La regina e l'imperatrice / The Queen And The Empress

When Maria Theresa succeeded her father, the Habsburg King Charles VI – the last male heir of a house that had been in the ascendance for centuries – many feared that a charming, young and inexperienced woman would not be able to bear the heavy weight of the crown. But armed with humility and determination, she turned out to be an enlightened monarch, a 'mother of the nation', showing love for her subjects and attention to their needs. The empress was naturally drawn to mediation, but she could also be firm and pragmatic, introducing a series of major reforms. Obliged for reasons of State to give Marie Antoinette, barely fourteen years old, in marriage to the French Dauphin - to strengthen the alliance between Vienna and Versailles - Maria Theresa never stopped worrying about the behaviour of her young daughter, whose lively personality tended towards frivolity and ostentation. Called 'the Austrian woman' by her enemies and considered to be the emblem of an oppressive power, Marie Antoinette attracted the people's hatred for the mistakes she made early in her reign – a hatred that was fanned by the vicious defamatory campaign to which she was subjected. But she showed great steadfastness and courage during the vears of the Revolution. In October 1793, after making her way with much dignity through the furious crowds, she was guillotined. This absorbing account, bringing to life the two most influential women in eighteenth century Europe, is a compelling examination of two distinct and contrasting interpretations of power, which throws new light on the difficult transition between the dying embers of absolutist monarchy and the sometimes bloody emergence of a new democratic era.

"The Leopard in the GDR began with a flash of lightning and soon became an obsession."

In 1960, with the two Germanys long divided and the socialist regime of the GDR preparing to build the Berlin Wall, the West is seen as an immense threat. In this climate of political and cultural rigidity, where every action, choice, and behavior is scrutinized for its adherence to socialist orthodoxy, a book arrives like an alien and crosses the Iron Curtain that is about to descend permanently over the GDR. It is The Leopard by Tomasi di Lampedusa, a novel about the decay of an aristocratic family, which had already faced controversial reception in Italy, where it was subjected to violent attacks from the most orthodox leftist intellectuals. But, against all odds, the novel overcomes the rigid practices guiding East German editorial choices and even emerges as a symbol of the new socialist course. The driving force behind this unorthodox publication is Alfred Kurella, head of the Culture Commission and right-hand man to Walter Ulbricht, the head of state of the German Democratic Republic. Navigating through the crossfire of procedures and suspicions of ideological heresy, along with fanciful arguments, international criticism, and endless bureaucratic setbacks, Kurella champions a book that for him is a genuine love affair. Through archival material, direct testimonies, and documents never before translated, an engaging historical reconstruction unfolds like a detective investigation. This is a valuable piece in the story of one of the greatest masterpieces of 20th-century Italian literature.



Venice and the secret greenery of its gardens and islands, presented in all four seasons, are at the heart of this lavishly illustrated volume. The sumptuous gardens of the palazzi that overlook the Grand Canal, along with the more vernacular ones of the islands of the lagoon (Mazzorbo, Torcello, San Francesco del Deserto and others) are captured in unprecedented fashion through the passing of the seasons (the flowering in spring, the opulence of summer, the colors of fall, the mists and frost of winter) by Marco Valmarana, in a series of 'animated' photos that are rich in details and emotions.

The texts written by Toto Bergamo Rossi, a great lover of gardens and fortunate owner of one of the finest in the city, recounts the evolution and history of the Venetian garden, between earth and water, architecture and landscape. Marco Bay, a landscape architect who specializes in the restoration of historic gardens, writes about what it means to possess a garden in Venice today, about the peculiarities and disadvantages this entails in such a problematic natural environment and how to fit in with the place's history. Alongside this, finally, a close examination of species of plant native to the region or well acclimated to Venetian gardens.

Marco Bay is a landscape architect, the author of projects in Italy and Europe for public and private areas. He specializes in the restoration of historic gardens and the environmental upgrading of commercial and industrial spaces. He has given lectures and held conferences at major Italian universities and contributed to the best-known magazines of architecture, design and art. Currently he runs a column in Ville e giardini.

Marco Valmarana in 2012 began taking his first steps as a photographer by chronicling the daily life of his city on his Instagram profile. In a short time, thanks to his love for his land, photography and travel, he turned his hobby into a job. Today, he is an established content creator and photographer and curates materials for various brands in different fields, from hotellerie to F&B to the art and automotive worlds. This is his first book.



The day and hour of liberation from concentration camps are often portrayed as a return to life and the end of unspeakable suffering. Yet for many prisoners of the camps—especially the few women who survived the reality was far different. This was true for Laura Geiringer, the sole survivor of her family, who returned home with the heavy awareness that she would need every ounce of strength to begin living again. Shame and disgust over what she endured compelled her to remain silent: who would believe her? Who could she tell about the horrific experiments conducted by Professor Carl Clauberg on women's bodies at Auschwitz? Those who had not experienced the camps could not understand and perhaps would not even be able to listen. Laura's only outlet to escape the memories of Birkenau's atrocities was her journal, where she confided her thoughts. Using these writings, along with newly uncovered documents and unpublished testimonies, Frediano Sessi reconstructs the tragic story of Laura and her family: from the tranquility of her childhood to the disgrace of the racial laws; from the attempted escape to Gruaro to her detention in Venice; from the deportation to Auschwitz on the same convoy as Primo Levi to her struggle to reclaim an impossible normality after liberation. Alongside the accounts of both her tormentors and the companions who endured torture and humiliation with her, this book powerfully conveys Laura's determination to resist absolute evil by any means possible.





Storia del corpo / Once Upon A Time The Body

When young influencers deny that they are commercializing their bodies, they are right: it's not their body, but the result of a complex negotiation between culture, biology, and technological innovation. A body that disappears due to excessive visibility. 

Joker Scatenato. Il lato oscuro della comicità / Joker Unleashed. The Dark Side of Comedy

For more than half a century, we have regarded entertainment, comedy, and humor as tools for social pacification. In 1985, Neil Postman's pamphlet Amusing Ourselves to Death warned that, thanks to the drug of commercial television, we had entered the cheerful, dumbed-down "Brave New World" foretold by Aldous Huxley. But then something unexpected happened. Ours is still a "society of entertainment." but comedy is no longer just an innocuous laughing gas—it has become the weapon for fierce political duels and cultural wars. A cynical, sarcastic humor has taken over public discourse. The king and his jester constantly swap places: political leaders adopt a stand-up comedy style, while comedians embark on unexpected political careers. A faction of the American left has launched a moralizing "war on jokes," and comedy is shifting to the right. From the underbelly of the internet has risen troll culture, with its nihilistic, subtly sociopathic sarcasm, resonating enthusiastically with the leadership of Donald Trump, who was aptly dubbed "troll-inchief" by the American press. Guido Vitiello attempts to decode this perpetual carnival by revisiting key moments in the social history of humor. His guide through this laughing inferno is the figure of Joker, the antihero from the Batman saga. Since the 1940s, Joker's successive metamorphoses have mirrored the different phases of our relationship with the "dark side of farce" and the unavoidable link between comedy and violence. In his latest incarnations—from Christopher Nolan's The Dark Knight to Todd Phillips' Joker—the supervillain has taken on the eerily convergent traits of a terrorist and a stand-up comedian. Having escaped, after decades, from the gilded cage of television hegemony soporific but universalistic—he has joined the identity-driven factions of social networks, where they tear each other apart with laughter. Today, Joker is unleashed.

















RAFFAELLA ARPIANI

born in Parma in 1971 and a Milanese by adoption, has developed her own approach to art, which stems from her education and diverse professional experience: hands-on practice as an artist and curator, work in communication as a copywriter, and her role as an art history teacher at high school. writing for nearly every major Italian news magazine and women's publication. For the past fifteen years, she has been the voice of current events and politics for *Marie Claire Italia*.





We often approach works of art, whether ancient or contemporary, seeking their meaning, sometimes feeling discouraged or inadequate due to a lack of sufficient knowledge and understanding. But what if we didn't need the expertise of an art critic to uncover their gifts? What if we could learn from the Venus de Milo, a painting by Manet, Van Gogh, or Caravaggio, not just something about them, but something about ourselves? What if we learned the complicated art of living from them? After reading this book, we will no longer want to "talk about art," but rather "dialogue with art," reciprocating the gaze of its countless masterpieces as if we were standing before mirrors scattered in museums and cities around the world.



Have you ever wondered what plants would say if they could talk? What goes through the mind of a group of lime trees when threatened with being cut down, or how pleased a poplar might be to have ivy scrambly up it? In this book, it is the plants themselves that tell you (with my modest contribution as an interpreter, communicator, and forestry expert). I immersed myself in their roots because I have always been fascinated by them: they seem static and silent, but they are actually incredibly adaptable. Unable to move, they have had to develop remarkably original ways to overcome environmental pressures, turning disadvantages into opportunities. Take the shade-loving plants that thrive where light is scarce, the elegant aquatic plants that perform photosynthesis on the water's surface (and sometimes below it), or the ability of some to literally poison predators and competitors or exploit others' resources. Although I have given a voice to the plants themselves, I have insisted on maintaining the accuracy of scientific information. This is because sophisticated dynamics such as those developed by nature to adapt, reproduce, and integrate into ever-changing ecosystems (and even to "domesticate us") are not something I could have invented. I hope these pages mark the beginning of a surprising journey into the world of plants—whether they are by the sea, in the mountains, in a meadow, or on a shelf at home—wishing you never end up like me, eavesdropping on their conversations to spill everything in a book.





Mariangela Gualtieri said that she was born as an author of poetry with the lines "parlami che / io ascolto parlami che / mi metto seduta e ascolto" ("talk to me that / I listen talk to me that / I sit down and listen"): this is the beginning of Ancestor, her debut collection, first published by Crocetti in 1992. These lines that sound like an invocation and a request for an exchange with the sacred and with the invisible presences of the world are part of a dialogue that has continued, uninterrupted, over the years. Ancestor is a collection of poems full of often surprising images and the declamatory tone of many texts, originally written for the theatre, are the nucleus of the style that made Mariangela Gualtieri one of the most important contemporary poets.





Mikrokosmos, like the piano work of the Hungarian composer Béla Bartók: 153 pieces of progressive difficulty intended for instrumental study. This volume refers to the idea of the "microcosm," a small autonomous universe and a language of poetry (or music for Bartók) firmly rooted in material reality.

This is the only anthology of verses published by Sanguineti and it encompasses the entire poetic work of the author together with some unpublished poems. This collection accounts for more than fifty years of activity and outlines a new image of the poet and his work. So much so that we can refer to the book as a "new" Sanguineti collection, since the work of selecting and assembling was not merely a cutting-and-pasting technique but a more considered and holistic process representing all the genres and languages practiced by the author.

Modern Classics and Backlist Rediscoveries



SIBILLA ALERAMO

(14 August 1876-13 January 1960) was an Italian author and feminist best known for her autobiographical depictions of life as a woman in late 19th century Italy. Active in political and artistic circles, she wrote ex-

tensively on feminism and homosexual understanding; she was also a diarist and close to many literary intellectuals of the early part of the 20th century.



DANIEL BARENBOIM

From 1975 to 1989 Daniel Barenboim (Buenos Aires, 1942) was musical director of the Orchestre de Paris, from 1991 to June 2006 he was musical director of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, and since 1992 he has been musical director of the Berlin State Opera, of which he was also artistic director from 1992 until August 2002. In 2000 the Staatskapelle of Berlin named him principal director for life. In 1999 with

Edward Said he founded the West-Eastern Divan Orchestra, made up of young musicians from Israeli and Arabic countries. In 2007 he was honored in Japan with the Praemium Imperiale for culture and the arts and was nominated by Secretary General Ban Ki-moon as the United Nations' peace ambassador. He has published *A Life in Music* (1991, 2002), among many other books.



Una donna / A Woman

A Woman, which describes Aleramo's decision to leave her husband and son and move to Rome, is a key text for understanding Italian women's writing of the twentieth century. It is a Bildungsroman whose endpoint is a new, emancipated female identity. This journey to emancipation has aspects of the heroic to it, but Aleramo is careful to underscore the compromises, risks and losses (most poignantly, of her son) along the way. This genre of the journey to emancipation through loss and guilt recurs in politicised works published much later in and around the feminist movements and key debates over divorce and abortion legislation (e.g. Orianna Fallaci's Letter To An Unborn Baby). A Woman also touches on several crucial symbolic aspects of the subordination of women under patriarchy – the silencing of women; sexuality, rape and the law; mother-daughter relationship, women's insanity (here of the protagonist's mother) – which all feature prominently in later and contemporary works, both literary and political.




LUCE D'ERAMO

was born in 1925 in Reims to Italian parents. She died in Rome on March 6, 2001. Her books include Deviation (1979), Nucleo Zero (1981), Partiranno (1986), Ultima Luna (1993), Una strana fortuna (1997) and L'opera di Ignazio Silone (1971). In 1999 she published Io sono un'aliena ("I am an alien"), a "conversation" in which she retraces the steps of her existential and intellectual



MARIATERESA DI LASCIA

(1954-1994), fought for the causes of democracy and civil and human rights within the Radical Party, a bastion of anticlericalism, feminism, liberalism and environmentalism in Italy. She wrote several novels including Passage in the Shade (Feltrinelli, 1995), which became a literary phenomenon and won the Strega Prize in year of its publication. She has been compared to Elsa Morante, Anna Maria Ortese, and Giuseppe Tomasi di Lampedusa. Various articles and texts written by her have been collected in an anthology curated by Antonella Soldo (Edizioni dell'Asino, 2016).



Deviazione / Deviation

Lucia is a young woman of middle-class origins – the daughter of the Undersecretary of the Republic of Salò - who has lived in France and been much influenced, even from a distance, by the myths of Fascism with which she has grown up. Not only that, she now believes that among the lies circulating about Nazi-Fascism there is also that of the cruelty of the labor camps. She decides to see for herself what is happening, and goes, as a volunteer, to the camps, certain that her journey will enable her to refute the "slander" against the treatment of those who "work" on behalf of Hitler's great Reich. Thus begins Lucia's descent into hell, a violent and complex experience of a horror that consumes her existence and even becomes a sort of norm.

The traditional difference in character between male and female is not due to "innate" factors, but rather to the "cultural conditioning" that the individual undergoes during development. Because this situation is entirely "against the female sex." Elementi di critica omosessuale / Homosexuality and Liberation

First published in Italian in 1977, Mario Mieli's groundbreaking book is among the most important works ever to address the relationship among homosexuality, homophobia, and capitalism. Mieli's essay continues to pose a radical challenge to today's dominant queer theory and politics. With extraordinary prescience, Mieli exposes the efficiency with which capitalism co-opts "perversions" which are then "sold both wholesale and retail." In his view the liberation of homosexual desire requires the emancipation of sexuality from both patriarchal sex roles and capital. This work of liberation is the basis of a process of dissolution and recomposition of the human identity, which aims at the achievement of a new androgynous and pansexual subjectivity.

Mieli's work served as a launching pad for many subsequent studies that, beginning in the 1980s, have brought into play different categories of sexuality in the name of a creative vision of the concepts of gender and identity.

BORIS PASTERNAK

was born in Moscow in 1890 and after briefly training as a composer resolved to be a writer. He published a large number of collections of poetry, written under the burden of Soviet Russia's stringent censorship, before his most famous work, Doctor Zhivago, was published in the West – remarkably, daringly, brilliantly – by Giangiacomo Feltrinelli in 1957. Pasternak died in 1960.



GIOVANNI TESTORI

(1923-1993), an art critic, poet, dramatist, and novelist, was one of the most complex and important intellectual personalities of the twentieth century. In the 1950s he evoked the outskirts of Milan in the series *The Secrets of Milan* and the dramatic text L'Arialda. In the '70s, in his first theatrical trilogy (L'Ambleto, Macbetto, and Edipus),

he invented a dramatic language all his own. After Conversation with Death and The Interrogation of Mary, in the 1980s he wrote two "Brancatrilogies" for the actor Franco Branciaroli and brought to the stage one of his masterpieces, the novel In exitu. His last work, a kind of testament and a hybrid of theater and poetry, was Tre lai.

Il ponte della Ghisolfa / Ghisolfa Bridge

Ghisolfa Bridge is a collection of nineteen inter-connected stories published by Giovanni Testori in 1958. It formed part of a larger cycle of works, a kind of "human comedy" entitled *The Secrets of Milan*, "where everything - names and situations, characters and environments - keeps to itself, intertwines with itself, confirms itself." Ghisolfa Bridge reflects "the world of Milan's periphery, populated by poor devils who pull the cart at the factory or to the shops, but also idlers ready for anything, prostitutes and lads learning from the school of life, thieves and bosses licensed to blackmail if not outright kill, aspiring athletic champs and the shady nouveaux riche." The characters of *Ghisolfa Bridge* are all very young: workers and bartenders, who, in a Milan on the brink of the economic boom, struggle to survive, living on the outskirts among the big gray buildings (Roserio, Ghisolfa, Porta Ticinese), going to gyms to cultivate their ambition of becoming cycling or boxing champions, passing their Sundays at the "pictures" or dance halls, falling in love. A poignant portrayal of an erstwhile Milan, Ghisolfa Bridge is the book that inspired Luchino Visconti to make the classic film *Rocco and His Brothers*.

Other Libertines has had an adventurous life: published in 1980, seized for obscenity and then acquitted by the court, it was simultaneously judged by critics to be one of the best works of recent years and established Tondelli among the new Italian authors most read also abroad. La dieta degli ormoni / The Hormone Diet

Slimming is primarily a matter of hormones. Hormones are our body's chemical messengers that regulate hunger and satiety, modulate our digestive ability to absorb calories, but also our mood, serenity and sleep, conditions that prompt us to eat more or less.

Offering the shift in perspective is the endocrinologist Annamaria Colao. For years with her team at the Federico II University in Naples she has been studying the delicate balances that dictate our relationship with food, and the synthesis of her research is finally presented in this book, La dieta degli ormoni, a manual that enables everyone to lose weight in a healthy, rapid and lasting way by acting at the roots of metabolism. Readers will discover that there are foods to favour and foods to limit depending on the time of day and the stage of one's life.

Dr. Colao's diet consists of four schemes that feature four hormones, to be interwoven and alternated at various times of existence. The Insulin Stop scheme aims to reduce circulating insulin by going after fat stores, particularly abdominal fat. The second scheme, Serotonergic, goes along with the release of serotonin, the feel-good hormone. The third, Leptinic, restores the balance between ghrelin and leptin, the two hormones involved in hunger and satiety. The last scheme, Melatonin plus, promotes the production of melatonin, the sleep hormone, and enables a periodic reset of the metabolism.


