Tony and Olivier award-winning *Prima Facie* is the hottest play in the world right now. The West End and Broadway productions starring Jodie Comer broke records and is set to do the same all the over the world with productions in a further 30 countries planned and a film in pre-production starring Cynthia Erivo. It's a work of fiction, but it could have been ripped from the headlines any day of the week, so common you could cry. Now the author, Suzie Miller, has re-imagined the story as a novel.

Tessa is a criminal lawyer at the top of her game who knows the law permits no room for emotion. To win, you just need to believe in the rules. And Tessa loves to win, even when defending clients accused of sexual assault. Her court-ordained duty trumps her feminism. But when she finds herself on the other side of the bar, Tessa is forced into the shadows of doubt she's so ruthlessly cast over other women.

Turning the world's courts of law into a different kind of stage, Miller's taut, rapid-fire and gripping story exposes the shortcomings of a patriarchal justice system where it's her word against his.

Prima Facie is a propulsive, raw look at the price victims pay for speaking out and the system that sets them up to fail. With breakneck prose and a devastating emotional intensity, this is a novel for our times, by one of Australia's most impressive writers.



Suzie Miller is a contemporary international playwright, librettist and screenwriter drawn to complex human stories often exploring injustice.

Miller's work has been produced around the world winning multiple prestigious awards including Tony and Olivier Awards Suzie has a background in law and science, and is currently developing major theatre, film and television projects across the UK, USA and Australia. When you tip over 35 and people start to notice you a little bit less, what do you do with your new powers of invisibility?

Audrey Mendes is a lawyer who works like a trojan who is relied upon by many of her colleagues but she never quite makes partner. Her social life is regulated by family obligations, work events and the weekly trivia night at the local pub. She means to go to the gym and perhaps start dating but somehow other people's needs come first.

Audrey lives alone. People speak to her as if she will never have a partner or a child, and the instinct to parent grows along with her resentment.

After trying unsuccessfully to get the attention of the young man behind the counter of her local off license, Audrey walks out with two bottles of wine and no one notices. Rules matter and Audrey is enraged. She harnesses her confusion and fury and in amongst some good deeds, starts causing small amounts of havoc on those who, perhaps, deserve it - until her life reels out of control.

Audrey fights back against being invisible and on the outer, in sneaky, funny, naughty and not always legal ways. And, spoiler alert, Audrey triumphs, tipping some way-too-comfortable people out of their cocky positions along the way. And, is that some romance for Audrey, just around the corner?

Written with a good balance of humour, frustration and anger, this is an all-too-relatable novel for those who love to be challenged by moral dilemmas.

Out of the Woods

Out of the Woods follows an Australian woman, Tess, who goes to work for an Australian judge of the U.N. International Criminal Tribunal for Former Yugoslavia in the Hague. While there, her judge hears the case of Radislav Krstic, in which the defendant is charged for war crimes associated with Srebrenica

During the trial, Tess gradually becomes obsessed with the defendant, but is at the same time transfixed and mesmerised by the testimony of witnesses. Over the course of the novel, Tess attempts to reconcile these two opposing forces in her own mind. As Tess listens to the testimony her own traumas, associated with growing up in poverty in regional NSW, begin to surface. Listening to these testimonies thus brings her into an uncomfortable confrontation with her history of childhood abuse and neglect.

The Tribunal's hearing of the Krstic case is particularly significant, since it was the first time that the witnesses spoke about these events, which involved the murder of over 8,000 men and boys, many of whose bodies were not recovered at the time of the trial. The title is a reference to the way the women of Srebrenica refer to their husbands and children as never having returned 'out of the woods', where they fled to apparent safety.

Out of the Woods is part of a literary movement that recognises the importance of witnesses to catastrophic events being heard and understood in their own words. It will appeal to readers of Katie Kitamura's Intimacies and Svetlana Alexievich's documentary novels.



Gretchen Shirm is the author of a collection of short stories Having Cried Wolf, for which she named a 2011 Sydney Morning Herald Best Young Australian Novelist. Her first novel Where the Light Falls, was shortlisted for the 2017 Christina Stead Prize for Fiction in the NSW Premier's Literary Awards. Her second novel, The Crying Room, was published in July 2023 by Transit Lounge to great acclaim

By his side is his driver and right-hand man, Vasil Murtov, Beria's closest friend since childhood. But to be a witness is the most dangerous act in this world; Murtov must protect his family and play his own game of survival while remaining outwardly loyal to an increasingly unstable Beria. With the action moving between Moscow and Georgia, the tension ramps up as Stalin's visit and the inevitable bloodbath approaches. Is Murtov playing Beria, or is he being played?

The First Friend is a novel in a time of autocrats, where reality is a fiction created by those who rule. Reflecting on Putin's Russia, Trump's America, Xi's China and Murdoch's planet earth, it is at once a satire and a thriller, a survivor's tale in which a father has to walk a tightrope every day to save his family from a monster and a monstrous society. Where safety lies in following official fictions, is a truthful life the ultimate risk?



Author biography



Jennifer Robinson is an Australian human rights and media lawyer and feminist, who is internationally recognised for her work. She represented Amber Heard in relation to Johnny Depp's 2020 defamation case in the UK; has defended Julian Assange and advised WikiLeaks since 2010; worked on establishing the legal case that the Pope and the Vatican were responsible for crimes against humanity; and advised The New York Times during its phone-hacking investigations in London; and acted for the BBC World Service to take action against Iran for the persecution of BBC Persian staff and their families.

She is a practicing barrister at Doughty Street Chambers in London and has acted in key human rights, freedom of speech, and freedom of information cases before the British courts, international and regional courts, and UN special mechanisms.

Robinson grew up in a small Australian town with an insatiable curiosity about


the world that has produced a global impact. Exceeding expectations, first as a Rhodes scholar, then as a lawyer, Robinson's intellect, compelling advocacy, and principled commitment have given her a prominent international profile in cases where technology, freedom of speech, environmental issues, women's causes, and human rights intersect.

Seeing the law as a social justice tool strengthening movements for positive change – Robinson worked with a philanthropist to create a global human rights program – the Bertha Justice Initiative – which has invested millions in strategic litigation and campaigns, as well as education and fellowships for the next generation of movement lawyers around the world.

Robinson's commitment to global change is unyielding and she wants to invite more lawyers to the fight. In addition to How Many More Women?, she is working on a memoir of her career as a human rights lawyer. Because of her unexpected career trajectory and her desire to give back, Robinson is committed to inspiring young people from diverse and disadvantaged backgrounds to see and realize their potential.

Spending her days scrubbing and washing, Thora burns with ambition, despite knowing that not even a free woman could ever be raised to such a height in her strictly patriarchal society. Thora's chance to prove herself arrives in the form of a missing persons case as she and her superior officer are assigned to the wildest and most perilous island on the frozen Frontier - Death City. A strange world of lore and superstition, it seems the strict Red Reform of the mainland hasn't quite reached the Frontier's distant shores, and for the first time, Thora experiences a true taste of freedom. She begins to change – becoming bolder, more driven and outspoken, and feeling closer to grasping her own future despite the restrictions of her lowly caste.

In Death City, Thora and Diem – a hard ex-soldier with hidden trauma and a secret love for Thora that can never eventuate because of their different castes – each follow the threads of the mystery, attempting to solve the crime and catch a vicious killer. Yet Death City is a strange and violent frontier, and no one who visits comes back clean. Welcome to the Red Kingdom.



Poppy Nwosu's debut novel, Making Friends with Alice Dyson, was shortlisted for the 2019 Readings Young Adult Book Prize and 2018 Adelaide festival Unpublished Manuscript Award. Her second, Taking Down Evelyn Tait, was shortlisted for the 2021 SPN Book of the Year. Her latest novel, Road Tripping with Pearl Nash, was listed in the CBCA Book of the Year Notables for 2022 and was awarded the SA Writers Fellowship residency at Varuna Writers House in 2019. She was also awarded the Max Fatchen Fellowship at the Adelaide Festival Awards for Literature in 2022. Poppy is also the creator of the YA anthology Hometown Haunts: #LoveOzYA Horror Tales. She writes dark fantasy for adults under the name PJ Nwosu. She is based in Adelaide, Australia.

Patrick White



Patrick White was born in England in 1912 and taken to Australia, where his father owned a sheep farm, when he was six months old. He was educated in England and served in the RAF, before returning to Australia after World War II.

He was the first Australian to win the Nobel Prize for Literature, in 1973, and is considered one of the foremost novelists of the twentieth century. He published thirteen novels (one posthumously), three short-story collections and eight plays. His novels include *The Aunt's Story* and Voss, which won the inaugural Miles Franklin Literary Award, The Eye of the Storm and The Twyborn Affair.

The great poet of Australian landscape, he turned its vast empty spaces into great mythic landscapes of the soul. His position as a man of letters was controversial, provoked by his acerbic, unpredictable public statements and his belief that it is eccentric individuals who offer the only hope of salvation. White died in 1990, aged seventy-eight. His novels have been published around the world to great acclaim.

A strong case could be made for White as the finest and most profound novelist anywhere in the world now working in English.
