This is the story of Cosima and the most memorable year in her life, when she turned eighteen and "so many things happened to her for the first or last time." Cosima recently moved with her family from a country town to the city of Cagliari and ever since she was a young girl, she always lived inside books, "fictionalizing" reality to make it more captivating. Her father does the same thing, he is a hopeless optimist who creates gloomy paintings and is often unemployed. Her mother has to support the entire family by working as a cleaning lady. Cosima likes the sky over Cagliari, the sea at Poetto, her literature professor, and her best friend Abya Yala: a wealthy kid who has the temperament of a revolutionary. But she misses her hometown a lot, so she goes back to visit her grandmother as often as possible. During these escapes, she falls in love with Costantino, a shepherd and a musician who is much older than her; he is very handsome, mysterious, and sad, and he immediately becomes her Heathcliff from Wuthering Heights. She slowly influences him with her dreamy outlook and wins him over: they share an exciting and very romantic love story filled with horseback escapades and secret meetings. But reality closes in on them with all of its brutality: in the realworld Costantino is married, Cosima's mother has fallen seriously ill, and Abya Yala is about to leave for Cuba, possibly forever. And Cosima is so sad that, for the first time, she is forced to climb down from her tree and set her feet on the ground. However, the violent collision with reality and the impetuous ups and downs of this memorable year will help her figure out what kind of adult she will become.

GERMAN RIGHTS PREEMPTED BY LUCHTERHAND/PRH Gaia doesn't want to be herself anymore. She shaves off her hair and starts wearing wigs, she sells her most precious earrings on eBay, she gets rid of her closet and buys a new bed, which she is then unable to assemble. She would like to rebuild herself and the environment in which she lives in the likeness of Veronica: her beloved, magnificent Veronica, who recently broke up with her. Veronica isn't just the person with whom Gaia is in love, she is also the woman she would like to become – as it happens with one's first, raging, narcissistic love story. Gaia's family comes from the solid bourgeoisie of Italians who live in Monaco, which embodies everything that Gaia rejects: humanistic culture as contempt and ostentation, the cult of appearances, the propensity to relegate menial tasks to subordinates. Veronica, on the other hand, is a lively woman, down to earth, extroverted, and a personality as sunny as her homeland, the Salento region. Gaia's monologue is at times angry and vengeful, other times masochistic, and sometimes scared and held hostage by a horde of sublime obsessions. She will get to know herself better through her soliloguy, and she will be ready to truly take risks in order to turn into the person she wants to become. She will finally realize that you inevitably have to start a fire if you want to be reborn from your own ashes.

MADDALENA FINGERLE majored in German and Italian studies and works as a university researcher. With her debut novel *Lingua madre* (ed. ItaloSvevo, 2021) she won the Premio Italo Calvino, the Premio Comisso Under 35, the Premio Flaiano Under 35, the Premio Città di Girifalco, the Premio Fondazione Megamark, and the Premio POP.

ROMANA PETRI Everything About Us

Romana Petri returns to narrate the family through the gaze and the fierce, unabashed words of an unforgettable protagonist.

Marzia discloses herself with rage, violence, and brazenness. She trains her lean physique through wrestling and learns how to turn her body into a barrier between herself and the world. But it is not enough. She can't escape the conflict, the spider's strategy, the web that her mother and father have woven around her, each in their own way. She believed (and keeps on believing) in the existence of perfection: she saw it in a dog that she wasn't able to defend, and she saw it in a guy she met on a mountain trail. She saw it but also considers it lost. threatened by the vulgarity of a razzing. Finding a way out requires sacrifice, change, closure. She goes forth like a cowboy or, even better, like the free woman she always wanted to be. Romana Petri masterfully accompanies the pounding first-person narrative of her Marzia as she stands on the verge of an abyss. The hell that she reveals, however, is part of a "whole": the more she feels the burn of the broken mosaic of feelings, the more it makes way for a possible life.





Rosa Bazzi is serving a life sentence for the quadruple murder that took place in Erba. According to everyone, she is a vicious killer, unable to have children of her own, a shady manipulator. A monster. The book Rosy is her portrait.

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In the early afternoon of January 8, 2007, Rosa Bazzi and Olindo Romano leave Erba in the backseat of a Carabinieri car. They don't know it vet, but in less than an hour they will find themselves in Como's jail, where they will begin a prison sentence that later will be turned in a life sentence convicted of murdering four neighbours and seriously injuring a fifth - one of the biggest recent news cases, known as 'the Erba massacre'. Alessandra Carati meets Rosa Bazzi. Between July 2019 and February of the following year, she visits her in prison every week in sessions lasting hours. "I vent when I'm with you, like with a priest," Rosa tells her one day, and overwhelms her with contradictory, unreliable speeches, bordering on comprehensibility. She forces her into her chaos. The author believed that knowing her in person would allow her to separate facts from words; instead, proximity has blurred the picture. In an attempt to understand, she seeks the gaze of those who have known her for the past seventeen years: the psychologist, the lawyers, and then the chaplain, her husband Olindo through the letters he writes. She discovers a neglected childhood, working as a child for families in Erba, marriage at twenty, and dependence on Olindo, the difficult adaptation to detention. Only then does she return to prison. However, Rosa does not conform to any narrative that has been told about her; she continues to resist like an indecipherable disturbance. It is precisely at that moment, in the renunciation of every image of her that Rosy emerges, as in a polaroid.

"I read Rosy breathless. This book excels in so many aspects: the portrait of a "simple woman" who may be a murderer, a – sometimes tender sometimes sordid – love story, an investigation – author and reader struggling for the truth –, a strong critic to the media. Carrère, Lagioia, Radden Keefe, Capote and Anatomy of a Fall came to my mind while I kept on turning the pages. I finished the book in tears, wanting to read it over again".

ALESSANDRO PIPERNO Family Resemblance

A new, wonderful novel by one of Italy's greatest authors and intellectuals, winner of the Premio Campiello Opera Prima, the Premio Strega, and France's Prix du Meilleur Livre Étranger.



Our main character and narrator is going through hard times. He is experiencing writer's block, he can't write a single line of his novel, and he is also losing interest in his academic work. All of a sudden, he receives a piece of news that throws him for a loop: the death of his high school classmate Veronica. He had a fling with her back in those days; he always admired her non-conformist intelligence and the courage that had led her to emancipate herself from her father's tyranny. How could she die at fifty when their teenage years still seemed to be just around the corner? Our protagonist is distraught. Meanwhile, he is accused of sexism at his university by a bellicose colleague who is an ultra-feminist. In his opinion, she is a paladin of a bogus battle that is actually aimed at climbing the echelons of power - especially if compared to Veronica's real social activism and the concrete and substantial battles in which she engaged at the time. After being kicked out from his university, he is melancholic, isolated, and an outcast, until he receives some surprising news: a juvenile court asks him to become his nephew's guardian: a ten-year-old boy called Noah whom he has never met. His parents had recently died in an accident, and now he is all alone in the world. After having many doubts, the protagonist accepts and starts having the time of his life with the child. Little by little, Noah wins him over entirely: he sees in him his same disorientation as an orphan combined with a sweetness and naivety that will help him look at the world through different eyes.

DARIA BIGNARDI Every Prison is an Island

A story of prisons, real or internal, a story of freedom, injustices, islands, and isolation.



"I've been visiting penitentiaries for thirty years," writes Daria Bignardi at the beginning of this book. She worked with a prison newspaper, she brought her conversations with inmates to television, she took her daughter to meet her grandfather in the visiting room when she was three months old, and she still volunteers at the San Vittore Prison. It was March 8, 2020, the beginning of the pandemic, when a few inmates climbed on the roof shouting "Freedom, freedom". "We are also afraid," she said, "can you imagine how scared they must be in there?" And she concluded by stating that "we need alternative measures." The video was loaded on the website of Corriere della Sera and it elicited many reactions. "I was inundated with insults, which didn't surprise me: I know how things are when it comes to prisons. Everybody hates them. And some love them when they are other people's prisons, so to speak." Bignardi has now decided to talk about prisons the way she has come to know them, sharing the most powerful stories she encountered over the years and her relationship with prisons, as a physical space and as an institution, but also as a concept and a psychological condition.

DARIA BIGNARDI has been living in Milan for many years. Mondadori published her novels *Non vi lascerò orfani* (winner of the Premio Rapallo, the Premio Elsa Morante, and the Premio Città di Padova), *Un karma pesante, L'acustica perfetta, L'amore che ti meriti, Santa degli impossibili, Storia della mia ansia*, and *Oggi faccio azzurro*, whereas Einaudi published *Libri che mi hanno rovinato la vita*. All of her books were literary hits that were also translated in several languages.

Catechismo femminista* (2022), and *Tre ciotole. Rituali per un anno di crisi* (2023), that sold more than 100 000 copies and that will be translated into German (Wagenbach) and Spanish (Altamarea).

The War of the Traversas

A segment of Italy's twentieth century, through the compelling story of a family of framers from Turin.



1910, Luigi Traversa turns his small carpentry shop into a factory that makes frames and furniture moldings. He hopes that his three sons will help him with the business, but Carlo (the eldest) is obsessed with opera, Mario fools around up and down the mountains, and Alfredo is the family's despair because he is a communist. Teresa, the only daughter, is in a relationship with Tazio, Alfredo's best friend who shares in his political activism. After a fascist dies in a clash with communist militants, the incident provides the excuse for Turin's action squads to organize a violent retaliation against all of the city's communists: it is December 18, 1922, and Alfredo and Tazio are twenty years old when they witness what will go down in history as the Turin Massacre. Many people in town are aware of Alfredo and Tazio's communist sympathies, so the two friends make a run for it; but only Alfredo manages to escape the fascists' guns and flees into France. After Tazio's death, the narration follows the Traversa siblings throughout the Fascist period and World War II, accompanying the survivors into the early 1950s, when their destinies will inexorably collide once again.

ALESSANDRO PERISSINOTTO teaches storytelling at the University of Turin. He made his literary debut in 1997 with the historical crime fiction *L'anno che uccisero Rosetta* (ed. Sellerio). He followed it with several books spanning various genres, which were published in many European countries and in Japan. Mondadori released his novels *Il silenzio della collina* (2019), *La congregazione* (2020), and the legal thriller series co-written with the lawyer Piero d'Ettorre: *Cena di classe* (2022) and *Il figliol prodigo* (2023).

The Gypsy comes from far away, he is the freak, the dropout, the philosopher, the prophet. He walks in and out of the scene with his wisdom and provocations; he is playful, he tears down easy truths, he chastises cultural heritage, he smirks at do-gooders and hysterics. He isn't vindictive, if anything he seeks retribution. He doesn't allow for setbacks. He engages in an intense dialogue with the author, a very uneven exchange of opinions. The two of them clash and come together, they travel along the routes of the present, through the pandemic, the climate crisis, the migrations, the constant stimuli provided by information and scientific progress. The Gypsy is a sort of Nietzschean dwarf who brings to the surface the voice of the lowest, the ones left behind; he leads to a neglected truth, an obliterated past, to the end of time. The two protagonists clash and annihilate each other, until they reach the very limit, the event horizon of a literal black hole destined to swallow their farewell. L'orizzonte degli eventi is reminiscent of Houellebecq, but amended with a passion that diverts cynicism into intellectual courage.



ARMANDA GUIDUCCI Two Women to Throw Away

Two monologues to give voice to the same difficulty of being a woman.



The two women "to throw away" that give the title to this diptych book (which is now being re-released after it was originally published back in 1976) are an anonymous middle-aged housewife and a young former prostitute called Stellina. While their voices and their stories appear to be completely different on the surface, they resonate through two heartfelt monologues that alternate tones going from forlorn, to sarcastic, to frenetic. The housewife expresses the dejection and frustration of household chores in a Milan oppressed by smog, which becomes the symbol of the filth of the entire world. Stellina seems to have made braver and more deliberate choices, even "getting out of the business," but she is still a prisoner of a society that won't recognize the value and dignity of women. Due donne da buttare is an isolated literary case by an author devoted to in-depth social and anthropological studies. Armanda Guiducci gives shape and voice to the concerns and struggles of living the female identity, back then as well as now. A text at times crude, marked by scorching realism and enduring vitality.

ARMANDA GUIDUCCI is the author of several texts ranging from in-depth studies to poetry collections, essays on literature, ethnography, and social criticism.

The Education of a Shepherd

After his father withdraws him from school after just a few weeks, little Gavino spends his childhood and adolescence completely illiterate and isolated, tending to his father's sheep. He will find ways to emancipate himself, first by learning how to play the accordion and later, during his military service, by starting to study again and getting a degree. A redemption that will inevitably lead him to clash with his father and master: a clash between two men, two generations, and two different worldviews.



GAVINO LEDDA (Siligo, Sassari, 1938) was born in a family of shepherds and was illiterate until he joined the army. After beginning his studies, he earned a degree in linguistics and later became an assistant professor in romance studies at the University of Cagliari. He wrote the autobiographical novel *Padre padrone* (1975, published in English as *My Father My Master*), which was adapted into a film by the Taviani brothers and won the Palme d'Or prize at Cannes. He is an accomplished scholar of Italian and Sardinian, he wrote several novels and poems, and he also directed and acted in a few movies.






This book presents a broad portrait of characters and situations in which the remote past is subtly compared to today's changed reality. The book carries on in a narration through memory conducted by an off-screen voice, a "body double" that brings to the surface faces, in a gallery of humble apparitions. Pelliccioli fluctuates between horizontal and vertical dimensions; he brings on stage household objects and amulets, details of everyday life, the meaning of birth and death, presences and disappearances, plants and small animals, words sometimes taken from dialects. We find ourselves in front of "invisible creatures / that swim in the sky," offered by the poet, who also seizes the problematic appearance of a contemporaneity that has become mechanical and technological. The journey of this work takes place in a sort of articulated poematic coherence, in the impeccable stylistic control of a music that swings from recitative to crooning, with moments of distinct realism but also with oneiric apertures, with traits of an effective (and nowadays unusual yet innovative) delicate expressionist coloring.

MARCO PELLICCIOLI published the books *C'è Nunzia in cortile* (2014), *L'orfano* (2016), *L'inganno della superficie* (2019), and the booklet *Il sogno del pesce gatto* (2023). His novel *A due passi dal treno* (2015) received an honorable mention by the Premio Calvino. He writes children's stories (published by Gallucci and Einaudi) and his poems were featured in *Giovane poesia italiana* (2020), an anthology that was also translated and published abroad (in English with the title *Young Italian Poetry*).

A volume composed of two poems that deals with the same subject, change.

Two narrative journeys in verse, two vast poetic movements that reveal through an unusual expressive energy the character of an author who has always moved with engaging effectiveness along the dual register of verse and prose. In his book Daniele Mencarelli composes a double portrait: two poems, complementary in their different physiognomy, in the entirely overturned linearity of a young couple's love story, and in the internal struggles – also in terms of pronunciation and versification - of "Lux Hotel" (the subsequent text). Two alternative approaches, from the apertures and turmoil of "Storia d'amore" to the complex metaphorical game of the second poem. The latter highlights the theme of negative heroism in its warlike connotation, with the "wonderfully idealistic" hope (as the author himself writes in a note) that "we might become a world that celebrates the heroism of forgiveness, compassion, and redeeming courage."



DANIELE MENCARELLI debut novel *La casa degli sguardi* was published by Mondadori in 2018 and was awarded the Premio Volponi, the Premio Severino Cesari Opera Prima, and the Premio John Fante Opera Prima and will be soon adapted into a movie. His second novel *Tutto chiede salvezza* (*Everything Calls for Salvation*) was published in 2019; it received the Premio Strega Giovani, it was translated in nine countries and was adapted into a Netflix TV series that was released in October 2022. *Sempre tornare*, published in 2021, concludes his ideal autobiographical trilogy and received the Premio Flaiano 2022.

GIULIO SPAGNOL Cannonball Charlie

A visionary, powerful, and very original debut novel.



An unfortunate event takes place in an elementary school classroom: a teacher, Miss Calamari, is found in a closet in a delirious state with the words "Cannonball Charlie" carved on her head. The headmaster looks into the incident. The class president objects that it couldn't have been Charlie: the boy, whose full name is Carlo Campo, doesn't have any arms or legs as a result of having contracted meningococcus shortly after his birth. Or at least he couldn't have acted alone. And that is actually the case. When the headmaster seems to disregard the child's disability, the truth comes out: Charlie is anything but harmless; on the contrary, he developed a philosophical awareness that has turned him into a leader. His classmates are entranced by Charlie's eloquence, he has become a point of reference for them, and they are ready to rebel. When their teacher announces that will be Charlie expelled from their school, they take matters into their own hands and lock her in the closet as if it were the only way to make things right. But the real plan unfolds while the class president is talking to the headmaster: all the kids go to the balcony holding a white sheet and they help Charlie complete his final flight.

GIULIO SPAGNOL has a neuroscience degree from the University of Oxford and wrote a thesis entitled "Investigations of the substantia nigra pars reticulata function and their implications for the disinhibition model of basal ganglia output." He works with the collective blog *Nazione Indiana* and this is his first novel.



Denis suffered the first mutilation when she was born: her name was supposed to be Denise, but it was cut short by the employee at the Registry Office. Almost as if foreshadowing the difficulty that would always accompany her in recognizing herself in her body and in a single identity. Later on, it was her stomach's turn: unable to lose weight, she underwent bariatric surgery, which left deep scars on her body and her mind. Denis comes from Mestre, a city caught between the noblewoman that is Venice and the industrialist Marghera; just like her hometown, she struggles to define her own identity. She works at night in a wholesale fish market despite being vegan. She chose that job because she loves the night and hates people: she can't stand their hypocrisy, their tendency to judge everything and everyone, and their corporatism. Anastasia is one of the few people she loves and a citizen of the night just like her. She was born Angel and she is trans: the choice not to opt for a mutilation becomes the basis of her tormented life, which is also joyous and mindfully chosen. Anastasia and Denis become best friends, but things get complicated when she shows up one day in Angel's men's clothes – and sparks fly between Denis and Angel.



DIANA CHIARIN was born and raised in Mestre, where she attended many creative writing workshops. She is an avid reader of poetry, which she believes is a form of resistance to life. Sometimes she runs into stories that turn into an obsession and she always hopes to become, in turn, the obsession of stories that demand to be told.

Manfredi is in love with Antonia. Like every young man in love, he sees her in everything, he explores her, he senses her, whenever she walks into a room it seems like she is always the largest presence in it. Everything around her is affected by her substance, or by her spirit, or by the dazzling banality of her simply being Antonia. She is this way in her everyday gestures, whether it is waking up together, going out for a pizza, hanging out with friends, or walking in the streets of Brescia, the city where they both live. "Even Antonia's name seems to me like a season, the favorite season, the one you wait for every year." Manfredi tries to explain what love is, with a simile, a declaration, a promise at every turn. There is such an emotional build-up that when Antonia asks him if it is really worthwhile to keep going out together, he is left breathless. Where will all of Manfredi's feelings go? And this is where the novel takes off, time accelerates, constantly overlapping and intertwining. Also because Antonia dies in an accident, and Manfredi struggles to come to terms with it. But did it really happen?

Antonina Pistuddi made her literary debut with L'isola del rancore, winning Italy's most prestigious literary awards and now, despite her success, she preferred living a quiet life. And now she is accused of multiple accounts of voluntary manslaughter of all the recipients like her of a fellowship at Villa Solitudine, an international center for the preservation of poetry and literature, located on top of Mararola's highest cliff overlooking the sea of the Cinque Terre. 

The restaurateur Emilio Zucchini is lowering the shutters of his trattoria Vecchia Bologna when he sees a figure limping under the arcades. He recognizes him: it is Maicol, a homeless person, slightly nuts, to whom he occasionally gives a hot meal. This time, however, Maicol is covered in blood and doesn't even have a scratch. Whose blood could it be? His trattoria is located just a few steps away from the "finestrella di Via Piella," one of the tourists' favorite destinations and the most Instagrammed corner of Bologna: a window overlooking one of the few spots where the Reno River flows above the asphalt. The police find a body with a deep head wound under the window. The victim is a young graffiti artist known as Giotto. For Commissioner Jodice and his officers, the main suspect is Maicol, who has disappeared into thin air. But Zucchini is certain that his friend wouldn't harm a fly, so he starts his own investigation on the side.

FILIPPO VENTURI runs a trattoria in downtown Bologna. He works for the Bologna office of the newspaper la Repubblica, where, for several years, he has been writing the column "Dietro al banco" (lit. "Behind the Counter"): a sort of reversed Tripadvisor in which the restaurant reviews its customers. In 2018, Mondadori published his novel *Il tortellino muore nel brodo*, the first dark comedy featuring the restaurateur-detective Emilio Zucchini. He followed it up with *Gli spaghetti alla bolognese non esistono* (2020) and *È l'umido che ammazza* (2022).

The Second Way of Doing Things

A former criminologist specialized in sex crimes finds herselves investigating again on the killer she hunted for years.

There is a void in Eva Carini's mind. A two-year gap that was caused by an accident, which left in its place an addiction to oxycodone and benzodiazepines. Afterwards, she didn't feel like she could go back to her job as a criminologist specialized in sex crimes. To put her past behind, she used the money from her disability benefits to purchase at a bankruptcy auction a crematorium called Fabbrica Kronos, located near a town embedded in the countryside of Canale del Brenta. But her old job is about to turn up in her new life. The security and intelligence company with which she kept a service contract informs her that the monster they were hunting down had just killed a fourth girl. The autopsy revealed several similarities with the previous victims. Including the incision made with a knife: an eight on its side that goes from one shoulder to the other, the signature of the Infinity Killer. The time has come to apprehend the murderer, at any cost. And the months Eva Carini spent in Mexico studying femicides have taught her how. Eva realized in Juárez that there can be another way of doing things.



ROBERTO ZANNINI was born in Mestre in 1959. Robin Edizioni published his trilogy of alternate history crime novels *Le inchieste dell'ispettrice Sasha Trieste*. The first edition of *Il secondo modo di fare le cose* won the 2023 Premio Tedeschi.




The Similaun Man, commonly known as Ötzi, was found in 1991, returned in miraculous conditions by the Alpine glaciers of Alto Adige. Since then, he has become an endless source of information about life in the region five thousand years ago. But a human being is more than customs and habits. He also has a deeper intangible substance of his own, made of dreams, fears, desires, and regrets. In other words, emotions. If the mummy could tell us about his feelings from his display case today, just like his body revealed the food he ate and the injuries he suffered, what would he say? This is what Piero Lotito imagines: Ötzi discloses his story to the faces crowding the glass in front of him. From his youth with his father Urd and his mother Mael, to being trained as a hunter; and also nature's challenges, men's deceits, the unexpected return of his childhood friend Ief, and the sudden and heartbreaking love for Alesh, the woman he could not have; all the way to the tragic ending of a hunting trip and running away from his village.

PIERO LOTITO is a professional journalist. He published the book *Intervista su Milano* (1997), and the novels *La notte di Emil Vrána* (2000) and *Il pugno immobile* (2007). In 2022, he wrote *Lo zio Aronne somigliava a Jean Gabin*. He also wrote a few plays, including *Aspettando l'autore* and *E Sancio lo tradì*, which have gone on stage several times.

Claudio is forty years old and lives in Falconara Marittima, a small town without much personality where the days go by placidly. This is where he spent unforgettable summers with his historic friends. He is the only one from the group who staved, everyone else made different choices, perhaps braver ones. The days on the beach, the improvised day trips, the rock concerts right under the stage are just a memory from the past; their friendship now carries on in a group chat on WhatsApp with a melancholic name: "On the pier." Out of all of them, Claudio is the one who suffered the most during the pandemic; after the umpteenth proof of the superficiality and hastiness of virtual relationships, he decides to make a "revolutionary" gesture: he gets in his car for a reunion the others know nothing about so that they can share once again the music they love, all the while leaving his phone at home. And yet, when his social media abstinence infects the other three, their dormant relationships regain their energy. That renewed authenticity will affect all of their lives, while each of them deals with the larger and smaller challenges of adulthood.

The Woman Behind the Atomic Bomb

The forgotten story of Leona Woods, the physicist who worked with Oppenheimer on the atomic bomb.



"I am Leona Woods. I worked in the Manhattan Project doing the same things as Enrico Fermi, but I was nineteen years younger than him and pregnant."

"July 16, 1945. It is the morning of X-Day. I am here, on Compania Hill. As soon as we get close to 5:30 a.m. the countdown begins. Tchaikovsky's music is playing over the intercom to soothe people's minds as we wait for the detonation."

These are the words of Leona Woods, the youngest woman who was directly involved in the creation of the atomic bomb. The physicist, actor, and author Gabriella Greison undertook a long journey from Los Alamos to Chicago, from Princeton to Santa Fe; thanks to the research she conducted there, she retraces the famous Manhattan project, giving voice to the main female protagonist of a story that changed the characteristics of human existence. Oppenheimer, Fermi, and Compton are frequently mentioned in the stories about the legendary feat of splitting the atom. But Leona's presence is usually forgotten. She was a record-breaking twenty-three years old when she was recruited by the Manhattan Project: she was an expert in finding particles by using boron trifluoride detectors, she was a calutron operator, and she was skilled at measuring the neutron flux of the nuclear reactor. With this book, Greison reminds us of the role she played and the value of one of the great women scientists from the past, scientists who are too often forgotten and discriminated against in historical reconstructions.

GABRIELLA GREISON is a physicist, a writer, an actor, and a science popularizer. She has a degree in nuclear physics from the University of Milan and has worked at the École Polytechnique in Paris, among others. Corriere della Sera and the American press have dubbed her the "rockstar of physics." She is the author f ten educational books on quantum mechanics, the history of physics, and the great women scientists in history, three topics that are very close to her heart. Among these publications, *L'incredibile cena dei fisici quantistici* (ed. Salani), *Sei donne che hanno cambiato il mondo* (ed. Bollati Boringhieri), *Ucciderò il gatto di Schrödinger* (ed. Mondadori), and *Guida quantistica per anticonformisti* (ed. Mondadori).



Why Italy Didn't Become a Feminist Country

A lucid and compelling dissertation that explains why women's issues are still very divisive.



The second wave of feminism started to arrive in Italy in 1968 and spread throughout the seventies. It created a momentous movement, also thanks to prominent spokespersons such as the philosophers Carla Lonzi, Luisa Muraro, and Adriana Cavarero. They were years marked by great conquests, from the reform of family laws, to the introduction of divorce laws and abortion laws. It seemed like the beginning of a long march towards gender equality, and instead... something went wrong. A drastic series of setbacks started to happen from the eighties onward. Italy now ranks in the last places in Europe in terms of women's employment and the gender pay gap; gender-based violence is constantly in the news; and maternity and abortion are still very divisive issues. So what went wrong? Vanessa Roghi combines her personal views with a scholar's perspective in a book that addresses why feminism and gender equality have struggled to establish themselves in Italy as issues that affect everyone, men and women alike.

VANESSA ROGHI is a historian and author of history shows for Rai Tre. She was a Bodini Fellow at the Italian Academy at Columbia University, and she is an independent researcher. She has written many books, including the latest one published by Mondadori entitled *Eroina* (2022).

Endometriosis is a chronic and debilitating gynecological disease that affects 10-15% of women. Its causes aren't entirely clear, the diagnosis isn't always simple, and there isn't a definitive cure. The disease is still recognized and diagnosed with an average delay of ten years. Lately, thanks also to testimonials shared by influencers on social media, we have started talking about it more and things are slowly changing.

The story of Tea Ranno's life is deeply connected to her journey with that disease. This memoir, written in the powerful and moving language that her readers have come to recognize, starts off when she wakes up in the hospital. Tea is forty-five and she has just had emergency surgery for an infection that had spread from her uterus to her intestines, liver, and even lungs, and was about to kill her. The tape rewinds and the story of Tea and the fire in her belly goes back to when she was a teenager: the pain that is trivialized by everyone else, that can't be talked about, the interiorized sense of shame that drives her to downplay things, to hide; the relationships avoided, the loves lost, and finally a diagnosis; and then, when true love arrives, the difficulties in getting pregnant, in vitro fertilization, and more incorrect treatments, surgeries, and wanting to share and seek stories of other women who have also been living with that fire inside.



TEA RANNO has a law degree and works in law and literature. Her debut novel *Cenere* was finalist for the Premio Calvino and the Premio Berto, and winner of the Premio Chianti. She then published the novels *In una lingua che non so più dire* and with Mondadori *La sposa vermiglia* (2012, winner of the Premio Rea), *Viola Fòscari* (2014), *L'amuru-sanza* (2019), *Terramarina* (2020, winner of the Premio Città di Erice), and *Gioia mia* (2022).





CAMILLO RICORDI is the director of the most important research center seeking to cure diabetes, which is located in Miami. His research has recently also focused on preventing the recurrence of the disease after it was successfully cured. He also launched the program Fit4Healthspan to promote healthy longevity and founded the organizations The Cure Alliance and the Diabetes Research Institute Federation. He is the author of over one thousand scientific publications and the recipient of several awards and important honors.


