This is a novel by a master storyteller in the tradition of Robert Westall and Susan Cooper, and yet with Hyder's original voice and unique story-telling power.







A delightful story of familial love and friendship, coping with bereavement, being true to yourself and being brave enough to try something new.









KING WINTER'S BIRTHDAY

It's King Winter's birthday, and he wants it to be really special. He wants all of his brothers and sisters to be there: King Summer, Queen Spring and Queen Autumn.

But the leaves and the trees whisper a warning, and as the four play magical games, something strange begins to happen outside.

An achingly beautiful picture book by Jonathan Freedland inspired by a story from Ulrich Alexander Boschwitz, author of *The Passenger*, and illustrated by Emily Sutton.

The inspiration behind the story...

Ulrich Alexander Boschwitz wrote *The Passenger* in his early 20s over the course of a few weeks, in response to Kristallnacht and the tyranny overtaking Nazi Germany. Though he managed to escape persecution for his Jewish background by coming to England, he was interned on the Isle of Man as an 'enemy alien' - despite having lived outside Germany since the early 30s.

While interned on the Isle of Man, Boschwitz wrote a children's book called *King Winter's Birthday*, for which his mother did some basic illustrations. The story was never published, in any language, but the (German) manuscript survives in full in the Leo Baeck Archive in New York. Freedland was blown away by *The Passenger*, and he has adapted Boschwitz's only children's story for a new, contemporary picture book.
